Levy on Gasoline
BRINGS \$13,750,000
TORONTO, Jan. 2.—Tax on gas-
oline brought the Province of On-
tario \$13,750,000 for the year end-
ing October 31, last, department of
highways figures show.
This is the largest amount col-
lected since the gasoline tax came
into force and exceeds the 1929 fig-
ures by \$2,250,000.
There are approximately 510,000
motor vehicles in the province. In
the present fiscal year, the depart-
ment expects a revenue of at least
\$11,000,000 from the tax. The rate
was increased from three to five
cents a gallon in March, 1929.
