Following is a report of the year's work read by the Regent:
The "Hillsborough" Chapter of the I. O. D. E. has come to the conclusion of its first complete year as an organization. It's work accomplished during 1941 was important.

In January, through the kindness of Lieut. Gov. and Mrs. LePage allowing us to use Government House we were able to raise over \$100 at a Bridge Party held there. With this money we bought a quantity of wool and material to make clothing for evacuee children in England. It must be acknowledged with gratitude the following merchants who so generously gave prizes for this party: Prowse Bros. Ltd., Moore and McLeod Ltd., Jamieson's Drug Store, Mr. Milton Bell, S. A. MacDonald, Ltd., Ed's Taxi, Reddin's Drug Store, Henderson and Cudmore, R. T. Holman Ltd., Kelly and McInnis, Jenkins' Pharmacy, Carvell Bros. Ltd., G. H. Taylor, R.E. Mutch, and Mr. Harper MacNeill.

In June, prior to sending a large box of clothing to Lady Reading in England, a tea was held at which the garments were displayed. It was with the splendid patriotic cooperation of financial assistance of R. T. Holman Co. Ltd. that during July the "Hillsborough" Chapter was privileged to sponsor a showing of the Royal Dolls, "France" and "Marianne". These dolls loaned to Canada under the guardianship of Miss C. V. Beatty and were under the auspices of the Canadian National Committee on Refugees. In Charlottetown, nearly \$400 was realized and this entire amount was sent to the National Committee to help destitute and needy refugees in Canada.

Victory Loan Sunday Feb. 22

Sunday, February 22nd, is to be Victory Loan Sunday. The Dominion Public Relations Committee has already moved to win the co-operation of religious groups in the country through an appeal by the Finance Minister to the leaders of every denomination. In that appeal Mr. Heisey says in part: "Once more in the cause for which Canada is fighting may I request your co-operation in awakening public interest in the forthcoming Second Victory Loan, in which \$600,000,000 is sought. We have appreciated the assistance granted by the churches and laymen alike in our past efforts and I am confident that this time I ask your assistance again in making Sunday, February 22nd, Victory Loan Sunday. This will mark the opening of the second week of the campaign.

On Victory Loan Sunday, either at the morning or evening service both can be arranged that some adequate reference to the financial effort be made from pulpit or chancel in your churches, emphasizing the spiritual values that are at stake and the importance of the dangers that beset us? Mr. Churchill, speaking in Ottawa on his recent visit, said, "We are engaged in the greatest blessed work in the world, not only defending our hearths and homes but the cause of freedom itself."

Our clergy are confident that will rise equal to the occasion. They can point out the anti-Christian, anti-Jewish, religious persecution by the Nazis; the entirely foreign, non-Christian ritual of the Axis; the barbaric, brutal tactics of all the Axis hordes which threaten to destroy all that Christianity has built up through the centuries; the threat to freedom of thought and worship should the Axis win.

The armed forces of the Allies are fighting to preserve Canada's churches and the right of their congregations to worship as they wish. Victory Loan Sunday presents a golden opportunity to convey to our people the need for every church-goer to support this Victory Loan to the limit of his ability.

Although a Dominion Government ban on the sale of sliced bread has been in force since August 11, 1941, the Charlottetown offices of the Wartime Prices and Control Board had been receiving complaints that some merchants have been disregarding the ruling. The Order in Council which forbids the sale of sliced bread reads in part as follows: "Until further notice no person shall, without the written authority of the Wartime Prices and Control Board, sell or offer for sale any bread in sliced loaves, or slice bread for any other person."

LONDON, Feb. 6 - "The women of England deserve all the consideration that can be shown to them and all the help we can give them," said Cardinal Hinsley when he opened and blessed the Catholic Women's League Service Club (All-England and American Club) for women in the Forest at 11 Chester St., near Victoria Station. "Our women in England have been most splendid in their response to the call made upon them for national service," His Eminence said. He noted that with the presence in England of representatives of all the free nations of Europe and of the world the new centre would "encourage mutual understanding and mutual regard as a means of banishing the spirit of suspicion and mistrust amongst all those who have a common humanity and a common cause—the cause of freedom." Lady Winifred Elwes, National President of the C. W. L., said that the League has 50 service centres in England. The C. W. L. in Canada is assisting in financing this club which is non-sectarian and open to all the women of the forces.
