THE OFFICERS ELFC TED.

The Church Beautifully De-
corated and Luncheon
Served at Recess.

The beautiful and spacious audience room of the new Main Street Baptist Church, presented a delightful appearance Wednesday morning being the opening meeting of the convention of the Woman's Baptist Missionary Union. The floral decorations were beautiful in the extreme the platform, pulpit, stand and choir rail were one mass of ferns, palms, sweet peas and other blooming plants and the upper part of the Baptistery was a perfect mound of mosses, geranium leaves, acacias and other greenery.

At 9 a. m. the ladies assembled in the parlor where the registration of names and the presentation of badges to delegates took place, of whom there were in attendance from New Brunswick, from Nova Scotia and from P. E. Island. At 9:30 a prayer and praise service was held in the audience room led by Mrs. Smith of Amherst.

At 10 o'clock the President, Mrs. Manning took the chair and opened the convention with the usual devotional exercises. The following sessional committees were appointed by the President: Nominating Committee.—Mrs. John Clark, P. E. I.; Mrs. C. H. Martell, N. S.; Mrs. Melvern Parker and Mrs. H. B. Kaye N. B.

Committee on Resolution.—Mrs. Simms, Mrs. Cox, Miss Hume, Teller.—Mrs. Huntington, Mrs. Vaughan, Miss Lou Taylor, Miss A. A. Wadman.

On motion Mrs. W. V. Higgins of India and Mrs. Smith of Rhode Island were invited to seats in the Convention.

The committee on the "Link" the organ of the Missionary Societies in Canada reported as follows:

That in their opinion we continue our department in "Link" but on a larger and more comprehensive scale, and suggest that we choose an efficient editor who shall have charge of such department. There are now 200 copies of "Link" taken in the Maritime Provinces.

Mrs. S. M. Cox Provincial Sec'y for New Brunswick reported as follows: 30 Missionary Aid Societies two new ones added during the year one of which organized two months ago with 8 members, has contributed \$68 for missionary work. Eight societies are dormant. Nine life members have been made during the

year. Over \$3000 have been raised in the different societies. 183 letters and 56 cards have been written and several papers of missionary literature have been distributed.

On account of the death in June last of Miss Amy E. Johnstone the lamented Provincial Secy. for Nova Scotia the report for this Province was somewhat incomplete but somewhat over \$4000 have been contributed for Missionary work. The report was given by Miss Emma Hume who kindly offered to fill Miss Johnstone's place till the close of the present Convention year.

Mrs. J. C. Spurr, Provincial Secy. for P. E. Island, reported: 22 societies in the Province with a total membership of 355. Three life members have been made. Total contributions \$628.00 seven deaths have occurred during the year.

At 12:15 convention adjourned and were served with lunch in the vestry prepared by the ladies of Main Street church.

Wednesday afternoon session opened at 2 p. m. with a devotional service led by Miss Florence Clark, Missionary elect to India. At 2:30 the president took the chair and the session was declared open for business.

After reading minutes of morning session an address of welcome was given by Mrs. Wm. Alwood the oldest member in St. John. She referred briefly to the beginning of Women's Missionary Aid work in New Brunswick some 31 years ago. In behalf of the ladies of St. John she extended a hearty welcome to the delegates from the three provinces welcoming them to all the joys, sorrows and responsibilities of those who engage in work for the Lord Jesus Christ.

Response to this address was given by Mrs. Blackadar mother of our esteemed missionary now in India Miss Helen Blackadar.
