TELLS OF HINDU CONSPIRACY

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 7.—A group of Hindus, leaders in the alleged conspiracy to foment in the United States a revolution against British rule in India, cruised around Zulu Province in the Philippine Islands in a small sailing vessel on their way to India in 1915, according to testimony by Captain J. J. McCollister, U.S.A., former Lieutenant-Governor of the province, at the trial of thirty-one alleged conspirators in the United States district court.

McCollister said he detained Bhagwan Singh, until he could examine the Jolo Province, who liberated him.
