within a few feet but they respected Their Majesties' wishes to be left alone.

Only two attendants are lodged with Their Majesties in the cabin—T. L. Jerrard, King's aid, and Miss C. Maclean, the Queen's maid. Others in the royal party are in surrounding cabins.

**Witness Films**

This afternoon, before starting on the drive to Mount Edith Cavell, Their Majesties were shown thousands of feet of film they have taken since they left England. It was developed by the Dominion Motion Picture Bureau.

Officials of the Bureau had a problem of their hands today to find enough new film to satisfy demands of the King, who uses hundreds of feet a day. However, by borrowing from newspaper photographers and other Bureau chief, Capt. Frank Badgley, was able to keep His Majesty stocked.

On arrival at the Jasper Park station, three miles from the Lodge, the King and Queen were greeted by Hon. J. A. MacKinnon, Dominion minister without portfolio, who welcomed them back into the province. Mr. MacKinnon acted as the province's representative of the Dominion Government.

Welcome to the park was extended by J. A. Wood, parks superintendent, at an informal gathering at the station. Mr. and Mrs. Wood were presented to Their Majesties on arrival of the royal train.

Albertans and British Columbians, some of whom came as far as Prince Rupert, 750 miles west on the Pacific Coast, mingled at the station to shout a welcome.

The little town, named for Jasper Howe, is the site of the first Alaskan Valley trading post, was decked in flags and bunting.

after midnight with other special equipment such as the Admiralty's secret device for detecting submerged submarines.

Alphabets ranged far over the bay until temporarily ended their usefulness and were back at the grim job at dawn, seeking to spot the Thetis' resting place.

**Fear Of Collision**

The bed of Liverpool Bay is said to be largely sand and mud. Unless the Thetis narrows the channel, it was thought unlikely her hull had been pierced.

There was concern, however, over her silence. The craft is equipped with the latest radio devices. Experts feared collision with some sunken object might have put her electric system out of commission.

First word of the accident came when a tug accompanying the Thetis reported "something amiss" after the submarine failed to come to the surface at the time planned.

She had completed her surface trials and was making her diving tests prior to being put into naval service. She was commissioned in March after three years building at a cost of about \$350,000 (\$1,638,000).

Britain has been free of submarine disasters since Jan. 1, 1922, when the M-3 sank off Portland Bill, England, with the loss of 81 lives.

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**FIREMEN ANSWER TWO CALLS**—Firemen responded to two alarms yesterday, one shortly after 11 o'clock and the other about 1 o'clock. First fire, a roof blaze at 45 St. Nicholas was quickly extinguished with little damage. At the second fire, however, two lines of hose were laid before the fire was brought under control. The fire was in the roof of the Albert Murphy, 35 Valley Street and was caused by an overheated stove-pipe. It was said it was necessary to cut a hole in the roof before firefighters could reach the fire. There was considerable damage to the building from fire, smoke and water.

**SLIGHTLY INJURED IN CRASH**—A car driven by Miss Mary Brehaut, crashed into a tree at the corner of Rochford and Easton streets about 10:30 yesterday afternoon. Her father, Postmaster Wm. Brehaut, who was with his daughter, received a severe shaking-up and was taken to the P. E. Island Hospital where, after resting a short time he was able to return to his home. The front of the car was considerably damaged. Cause of the accident was due to a break down in the steering mechanism, it was believed.

**KINSMEN HEAR ADDRESS**—The development of Prince Edward Island from the time of its discovery by Jacques Cartier until the Province entered Confederation was the subject of an interesting address by Mr. F. F. Finney, assistant superintendent of the Charlottetown Experimental Station before the Kinsmen Club. A vote of thanks was tendered Mr. Finney by its address by Chairman Arthur Wright. Routine business was transacted at the meeting.

**TO SEEK OIL HERE**—Once again efforts would be made to find oil in Prince Edward Island, according to word reaching here yesterday from New York. Geophysical investigations in the Province would be conducted by the Lion Oil Company of New York, was reported and Dr. Luther S. Sneider, Chief Geologist of the Company, would be sent from that city to make arrangements for the survey. The Geophysical Survey is the advanced method of determining whether or not oil formations exist which are being extensively explored by the major oil companies. The Robert L. Doherty company of New York, now associated with the Lion Oil Co. of New York, is conducting investigations, carried on boring operations at Governor's Island in Hillsborough Bay here in 1923, 1924 and 1925 without success. Mr. Hugh Mackay, prominent in oil circles was in the Province last autumn in connection with arrangements to continue the search for "liquid gold" here.
