Does the Average Golfer Know How to Buy a Club?

Golf club manufacturers admit that there is an alarming shortage of good hickory shafts. One golf firm denied the statement and insisted that they had several carloads of shafts at their command. The pro would like to know how many out of a carload of shafts would be acceptable. There seems to be no end of quantity but a great shortage in quality.

The manufacturer of high class clubs admitted without reserve that only one in twenty hickory shafts was worth placing in a first class golf club. If this statement is true—and others verify it what chance has the average man to obtain a first class driver or brassie? With this percentage against us the golfer who possesses a good shaft should take extreme care of it.

Hickory is susceptible to weather conditions and often times the very best shaft obtainable is ruined completely through carelessness. Clubs should not be kept in a damp place nor should they be placed so that it will lean against anything causing the shaft to bow. After wet weather it is necessary for the preservation of the club to wipe off carefully and with a rag that contains a little high grade sewing machine or phonograph oil.

The new steel shafted has helped the golfer's forget many of their worries. This new innovation which has already proved its worth, will not warp nor rust and it is undeniably strong and will stand all kinds of hard play.

NEW YORK, Aug. 30.—Suspension of several well-known pugilists and managers for various offenses was announced today by the State Athletic Commission. Jabez White, of Albany, banamweight, was suspended indefinitely and ordered before the commission for investigation. Midget Smith, New York, banamweight, was set down for six months for "violation of contracts."

Jack Sharkey, New York, featherweight, and his manager, Joe Wagner, were suspended for one year for violation of contract and failure to appear before the commission.
