FOX CARETAKERS' ASSOCIATION

In Monday's issue we published a brief report of a meeting held by a number of fox ranch caretakers for the purpose of forming a Fox Caretakers' Association.

The organization as we understand it, is not intended to take the place in any way of the present Fox Breeders' Association or its administration.

The Fox Breeders' Association, composed as it is of widely separated members might, we believe, with advantage consider the question of branch organizations within the parent association.

THE KHAKEI UNIVERSITY

An educational plan in connection with the Canadian Forces Overseas has recently been inaugurated under the name of The Khaki University of Canada.

The object of the scheme is to provide educational advantages in the form of lectures, study groups, etc., for soldiers who wish to use their spare hours during the war period in preparing themselves by study or practical instruction for their future vocations.

The Khaki University is recognized by the Canadian Universities; the army authorities are extending their co-operation; and the Y. M. C. A. in Canada has agreed to assist as far as possible in the financing of the movement.

The teaching is done entirely by voluntary instructors—Chaplains and Y. M. C. A. Secretaries, as well as officers, N.C.O.'s and men who had previously been in the teaching profession.

The following facts show what has already been accomplished under the auspices of the Khaki University:

93 libraries have been established in the army areas in England and France.

8,006 men have registered in Khaki University classes in England. These are divided into subjects as follows: Commercial 2,351; agriculture 2,351; and other 3,304.

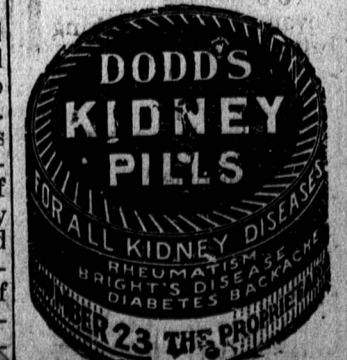
DO IT NOW
