

The King And Queen Again Honor Variety Stage By Attending Show

THEIR MAJESTIES AND DUKE AND DUCHESS OF YORK, SEE REGULAR PALLADIUM BILL OF QUICK MOVING PATTERN AND SLAPSTICK.

LONDON, May 27.—The King and Queen and the Duke and Duchess of York again honored the vaudeville profession by attending a special performance arranged for them at the Palladium.

The program submitted to His Majesty and approved by him a considerable time in advance of the performance, consisted largely of quick moving patter and slapstick from the "Crazy Month" repertoire which forms the regular bill at the Palladium.

Among old-timers who amused Their Majesties were Naughton and Gold, Billy Bennett and Flanagan and Allen. A comparative novice was Miss Evelyn Laye, not

usually regarded as a variety performer, although she made some of her earliest triumphs at the Oxford, now vanished, and at the Pavilion, which has now gone "movie."

The King first bestowed his patronage on the variety stage early in his reign and during the past 20 years few performers of note have failed to appear before Their Majesties at least once. The Duke and Duchess of York had never before attended a command variety performance.

Proceeds of the "royal variety" go to music hall charities. Last year's performance took in £4,000 for the Variety Artists' Benevolent Fund and Institution.

ANOTHER CONFERENCE NEXT WEEK—J. J. Trainor of Charlottetown, formerly acting vice-president for Canada of the Order of Railway Telegraphers, and J. R. Ross of New Glasgow, general chairman in that division for the O. R. T. passed through the city on the morning train. They were accompanied by Mrs. Trainor and Mrs. Ross and were returning home after attending the triennial convention of the Order which has been meeting recently in Montreal. Speaking on the conference which the general chairman of the order had with members of the federal government recently, with regard to obtaining a postponement of the additional ten per cent in wages imposed upon members of the running trades connected with both the large railway systems in the Dominion by the decision of the Board of Conciliation headed by Mr. Justice Gibson, of Quebec, recently, Mr. Trainor said that the matter was still very much up in the air. Another conference was to be held in Ottawa next week between employees in the running trades, Hon. R. J. Manion, Minister of Railways, and Hon. W. A. Gordon, Minister of Labor in the Federal Cabinet, when it was hoped that the dispute might be settled. Another course of action open to the men might be an appeal to the Supreme Court of Canada, their legal advisers having informed them that the proceedings of the Board of Conciliation had not been legally carried on. They were hopeful, however, of a settlement of the difficulty without recourse to legal action.—Moncton Transcript.

Develop Farming Among Fishermen Of Newfoundland

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., May 28.—(C.P.)—Newfoundland's government has embarked upon a campaign to make its people self-dependent by impressing them with the fact that a living can be extracted from the soil and supplying them with assistance in starting small farms. The effort is a timely one, for agriculture is an industry which has been greatly neglected in the development of the Island Dominion. Traditionally backward in farming, the Newfoundlanders have depended for their living upon the products of the sea. And when a poor fishing or sealing season has been experienced, he has fallen back on the government for aid.
