

INTERPROVINCIAL CONFERENCE ENDED

No Discussion Reached on Representation Question. Other Subjects Unanimously Agreed Upon.

(Special to The Guardian) OTTAWA, Oct. 29.—Although a variety of questions were discussed at the inter-provincial conference which concluded a three-days session to-night, on only a few, including subsidies increase equal to 10 per cent. of the customs and excise revenue of the Dominion, was there unanimity.

The proposals to carry them out differently was an invasion of provincial autonomy. In opposition to the proposal it was pointed out that the provinces had to acquiesce before any expenditure could be made.

NEW PLAN TO SETTLE MEXICO

It is now understood that he not only requested the European nations to await his policy, but also that the orient latin American republic action may take the form of a note setting forth that the principle of constitutional government alone must be established out of the chaos in Mexico.

TEUTONIC NARROWLY ESCAPED COLLISION WITH AN ICEBERG

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—A special cable to the American from Liverpool says: "The Teutonic narrowly escaped collision with an iceberg on her last voyage from Montreal." "On October 18, she ran into a thick white fog, after passing Newfoundland and got wireless notice from steamers of floating ice.

BOY ARRESTED TELLS UNUSUAL STORY

(Canadian Press) NEW YORK, Oct. 29.—Angelo Garcia, a fifteen-year-old Mexican refugee, was given into custody of the Children's Society to-day while an investigation is being conducted into the unusual story he told. The boy told an interpreter that his father was killed in the Mexican revolution, that he ran away from home because he feared he would be placed in the Federal army. He shipped as a stowaway on a British freighter and was put to work by the captain as waiter. When he got here the captain gave him \$10. On this money he lived while searching for work.
