TRUCKS IN COLLISION—An Irving Oil truck proceeding towards Summerside about 11:30 (Daylight Saving Time) last night was in collision with a parked gravel truck about a mile and a half on the eastern side of the Western Canal. The rear tank of the oil truck was torn completely off the vehicle as well as the gasoline tank tanks. About three or four hundred gallons of gasoline were spilled on the road as a result. OVERSEAS VOTE RECEIVED—The results of the Provincial Plebiscite are now complete with the returns of the soldiers' vote from overseas which was 193 in favor of the sale of beer and wine as beverages and six in favor of the prohibition act. This gives a majority of 187 against prohibition. Before the overseas vote was received there was a majority of 1565 for prohibition and this figure is now reduced to 1378, the final total being 9045-9054. The soldiers' vote in Canada was 1000 for beer and wine, 28 for prohibition, 995 for government control, 43 against, 66 for reducing the doctors' subscriptions and 966 against. The overseas vote respectively was as follows 193-6; 197-3; 9-192, making the respective totals for the soldiers' vote 1193-34; 1193-46; 75-1158. PLACE FOUNDATIONS AT AIRPORT—About 80 workmen were employed at the Charlottetown airport yesterday as the work is being rushed to completion. They commenced pouring the cement into the foundations for the building after several days of excavation. It is expected that their number will be increased to 200 by the end of the week, and at the end of two weeks the project should be in full swing, being at least 400 men. Mr. J. P. Pich, in charge of the work for the Storms Contracting Company, said last night. There are 200 workmen employed and 55 men employed at present and it is expected that later on there will be two shifts of 8 hours each. If necessary the work may go to work at 5 a.m. and the next shift follow immediately in order to take advantage of the daylight hour. Mr. Pich said. The number of men employed will be increased daily until it is up to the required number. A registration of all the labourers and carpenters in the city was conducted recently and it is anticipated that there will be a list of these men. MANAGER'S REPORT

Following is the text of the annual report of the manager, Mr. Bouter. "Twenty years ago this Association held its first Annual Meeting. We were then at our beginning and some of the things that assisted in developing the organization and you continue your allegiance to the principles and objects of the Association. Some of the leading farmers and men thought it was necessary to have a collective body of farmers working in the interests both of the production and the marketing of the crop. There was a great need for some reform in the potato industry. The varieties grown were out of date. The market was declining and falling off, and this province so especially well adapted by soil and climate for the growing of potatoes, was not receiving the returns from this crop that it could and should receive. And so began the work that expanded in influence and results far beyond the hope of the organization. "It is now an old story that in the following eight years a complete reform was effected both in production and in marketing. The value of the potato industry to the province due to the work of this Association was increased many times. It is our aim to maintain such an organization and good work has no ending. There are many matters in connection with the potato industry which unless they are followed up will result in serious loss. That this is true is demonstrated by the report which our management and directors submit to you today.
