ALLEGED DISCOVERY OF A NEW ANESTHETIC.

At a "broncho busting," or horse breaking contest some years ago the white cow-boys were much nettled to find themselves outdone by Indian rivals, who subdued the untamable perversity of the fiery bronchos with most surprising ease and celerity.

Later the cowboys found that the bronchos which the Indians operated upon had just before been treated to a feed of "sleepy grass," or stipa vaseyi, which grows in those parts. And thereby hangs a tale.

Investigation proved that sleepy grass was no bad food for animals. The cattle and horses which ate it remained in good condition, but for a time after partaking of it were sleepy, and strangely unconscious of pain.

These facts came to the knowledge of the Rockefeller Institute and a chemist was detailed to find out more about sleepy grass. He tried experiments, and the result is now made public.

Some of the grass was procured and an extract distilled from it which

was administered to a gentle rabbit. The rabbit went to sleep, and under tests it was demonstrated to be insensible to pain. When it awoke it was as cheerful as if aroused from a refreshing slumber. The heart's action had remained normal and there was no perceptible after effect, disagreeable or otherwise. The investigation has raised hopes that a very safe and valuable new anesthetic is discovered.

The new agent for producing insensibility to pain will not be inhaled as ether or chloroform is. It will be in the form of a pleasant drink, under whose influence the patient will quietly go to sleep, with no painful struggling against unconsciousness, no danger from heart failure and no sickness at the stomach on regaining the waking condition. This is what is now claimed, or at least hoped for, from "sleepy grass." Should it turn out so, the new anesthetic will come rapidly into use as a genuine boon to suffering humanity.

THE PROTECTION OF NEGLECTED CHILDREN.

The bill introduced by Premier Haszard and which will doubtless become law, results from the movement to establish Children's Aid Societies here, as advocated at a public meeting some time ago addressed by Mr. Scott of Ottawa, Sir Louis H. Davies and others. The movement has passed the experimental stage and has proved productive of great good in other Provinces and States.

It is proposed to take care of the neglected young ones, and for such

of them as have become guilty of offences against the law it provides private trial apart from the criminal courts, with subsequent efforts toward reform under new and better conditions and surroundings. Reform rather than punishment is the end aimed at. We are very glad that this measure is to become law. It will place this Province abreast of other enlightened countries in humanitarian progress and the machinery for effecting juvenile reform.

THE CLOSE OF THE NAVAL DEBATE.

After a debate of extraordinary length, frequently interrupted by other business, the discussion on the Government's naval program ended yesterday morning. Mr. Borden's amendment, which proposed a gift of two Dreadnoughts by Canada to the British navy and a plebiscite on the creation of a Canadian navy, was rejected by a vote of 179 to 74.

During the debate some eighty members took part in the discussion, and all shades of opinion found expression. The ministerial majority of 58 was perhaps larger than had been expected. There is no doubt that the Government's program will be adopted, although it may be by a less majority than that which defeated Mr. Borden's amendment.

Says the St. John Globe: "In this country it must seem surprising that open voting is so strongly supported, and secret voting so strongly denounced in Prussia by the ruling powers, but it must be remembered that in Prince-Edward Island, which is not supposed to be behind in enlightenment, open voting still prevails in provincial elections."

Referring to the recent tariff negotiations at Ottawa, the New York Herald says: "Unless some concessions are made by Canada—concessions for which full equivalent can be given—the Administration will be compelled to apply to Canadian products the increased rates authorized by the Payne-Aldrich bill."

The Rutherford Government has come to grief in Alberta. Hon. Mr. Rutherford, who led the revolt against the Waterways Railway bill and resigned from the Government has been called upon to form a new Administration. The Legislature being almost wholly made up of Liberals, there seems to be little political significance in the change. It is mainly a family quarrel. Hon. Duncan Marshall, well known in this Province, was a member of the Rutherford Government.

Senator Landry is somewhat exercised over Judge Longley advocating Canadian independence and wants him stopped. In reply to the Senator's questions Sir Richard Cartwright said Judge Longley had not obtained leave of absence, the Government had given him no authority to engage in such a propaganda and was in no way responsible for it. He was not aware of any method by which the Government could "stop" the Judge.

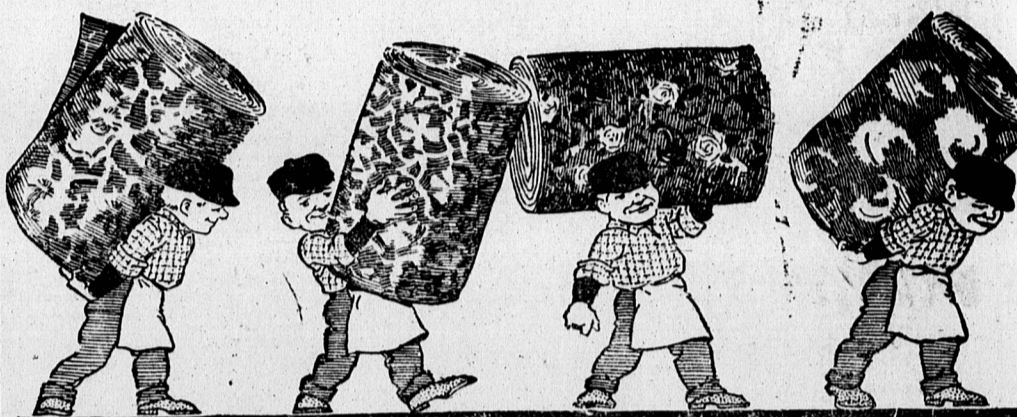
