WILL EXEMPT COMPANY FROM ALL TAXATION

So Council Decided at Meeting Last Night

BY MAYOR'S CASTING VOTE

The Minority Contended that the Period of Twenty Years was Too Long a Time.

A special meeting of the City Council was held last night to consider the question of exempting from taxation the plant and property of the Dominion Packing Company. Mayor Warburton presided and all the Councillors with the Recorder were present.

Coun. Wear, thought the Company was a good thing and should be given aid from the citizens. He had no inside information and could only speak from what he had learned from the press. Capital should be welcomed and encouraged, that is the opinion of all but the company want encouragement in tangible form. All the Company have asked from the city is exemption from taxation. He contended that Armour's in Chicago had been the means to a large extent of building up Chicago, the largest inland city in the world. The establishment of such a business here means a great deal to our City. He cited instances where industries had been exempted and believed the Company will make our City known through Europe as well as America. An increase in the production of hogs would bring wealth to our Province. More men will be employed and more money will be circulated in our City.

Coun. Paton welcomed the Company and hoped the working men would be benefited. He would like to allow exemption from taxation but in view of the fact that no revenue had been received from the plant during the past six years and as other smaller industries also needed assistance he would not like to go further than half way and give them exemption on additions to their present plant. He moved a resolution seconded by Coun. Hooper that the additions to the plant be exempted for five years.

The Recorder pointed out that the most that the Council could do would be to make a recommendation to the Legislature to pass a by-law to that effect. The Council could only exempt new industries.

Coun. Stewart had hoped that Coun. Wear was present at the afternoon meeting. All he knew about the industry was what he had read in the press. He was in favor of the industry and thought it deserved encouragement. An increased amount of wages will be paid and money brought to the Island.

Coun. Wear moved the following amendment seconded by Coun. Moore: Resolved that application be made to the Legislature at its next session requesting that the plant, real and personal property of D. P. Co., be exempt from taxation for the period of 20 years upon such terms, restrictions and conditions as to the continued operation of the plant and otherwise as may hereafter be agreed upon.

Coun. Moore in seconding approved of the D. P. Co. and believed they would advertise the Island.

Couns. Clarke and Stewart referred to the shipments of dressed meat being made by the Company and favored exemption.

ARCHBISHOP BRUCHESI OF MONTREAL TO RECEIVE RED HAT OF CARDINALATE

Semi-Official Announcement at Rome—Will Succeed Cardinal Taschereau—Mgr. Falconio Will Leave Ottawa for New Post at Washington Tuesday—Addresses and Presentations by Catholic People.

MONTREAL, Nov. 14.—A special from Rome says it is semi-officially stated that Monsignor Bruchesi, Archbishop of Montreal, is to be created a cardinal.

He will fill the place in the College of Cardinals vacated by the death of Cardinal Taschereau.

Canada's new Cardinal, Louis Paul Napoleon Bruchesi, is of Italian extraction, son of the late Paul Dominique Bruchesi, whose wife was a French-Canadian, Marie Caroline Aubry.

He is one of the youngest, if not the youngest Archbishop in the world, being in his 47th year. He was born October 20, 1855, in Montreal, and was educated at the seminary. He made his theological studies at Paris and Rome, and was ordained priest in Rome in 1878.

Shortly after his ordination he won the doctorate of divinity at Rome with a brilliant thesis. On his return to Montreal he was appointed to a chair in Laval University. In 1887 he was honored with the dignity of canon of the cathedral of Montreal, and in the same year was appointed professor of apologetics at Laval. He was consecrated and invested with the pallium in St. James' cathedral on August 8, in the same year.

His grace left Montreal for Europe August 15, and after spending some time

in France, proceeded in Rome, where he was received in audience by the Holy Father, Oct. 29.

DEPARTURE OF MGR. FALCONIO.

Ottawa, Nov. 16.—(Special).—The departure of Mgr. Falconio from Ottawa is calling forth expressions of regret on all sides and many Catholic bodies will voice it in addresses to his excellency. The Ancient Order of Hibernians will present their address Sunday afternoon in St. Patrick's hall, Monday evening the Knights of Columbus will express their regrets, and also present a gold cross with precious stones, the gift of Catholics of Ottawa and vicinity.

His excellency will leave Ottawa Tuesday morning. The same evening he will be banquetted by the Catholic societies of Toronto, and the following morning he will proceed to Washington. He will be accompanied by his secretary, Rev. Father Solanus Schaefer, who will remain in Washington a few days. Father Schaefer will return to his former duties at Chatham, (Ont.)

Rev. Booker and Rev. Francis Marchette, who have been secretaries at the Washington legation during the regime of Mgr. Satoli and Mgr. Martinelli, will act in a similar capacity to Mgr. Falconio. A successor to his excellency as papal delegate to Canada has not been named.

South African Memorial Association Finds That 228 Rest 'Neath the Veldt; Four are Buried in England, and 11 in the Deep—Memorials at Paardeberg and Kleinhart's River.

OTTAWA, Nov. 15.—A statement issued by the South African Memorial Association shows that of the Canadians who fell in the war 228 are buried in South Africa, four in England and 11 at sea, making a total of 243.

The relatives of 218 have been communicated with and the relatives of 14 cannot be traced. Of the 11 buried at sea, it was not considered necessary to communicate with the relatives as to place of burial.

Out of the 228 buried in Africa the graves of 89 have been definitely located by the association through the general officer commanding Cape Colony.

Three firms of stone masons in South Africa have been asked to submit drawings for two large memorials, one at Paardeberg and the other at Kleinhart's River the two actions in which Canadians especially distinguished themselves.

The Royal Guild of Women and Canadians prominent in South Africa, among whom are Mr. DeLothiere Colonel Steele and Colonel Greenwood have promised their hearty co-operation in the work. There is at present \$5,400 at the credit of the association and Lady Minto trusts that further donations will be forthcoming to aid in the completion of the work.

NEW POSTAL RATES FOR NEWSPAPERS.

On and after Nov. 15, the publishers of newspapers printed and published in Canada and transmitted by post, by 61 Victoria, Cap 2, may enclose with the folds of such newspapers as are addressed to subscribers, newspapers or newsdealers, pamphlets, lithographs, prints and engravings, and have the papers containing such enclosures transmitted by post at the rate of one cent per pound prepaid on the following conditions:—

- (a)—Each newspaper may contain not more than one such enclosure.
- (b)—The papers with the enclosures mentioned must be issued from the office
