Says Traffic Problems Need Drastic Remedy

DIOBY, N. S., Sept. 7 (CP)—The traffic problem in urban centres demands drastic measures of amelioration, Bertram D. Tallamy, chief engineer of public works for New York State, told the 29th annual convention of the Canadian Good Roads Association here today.

"Streets are cluttered with vehicles, accidents are all too frequent, and business is seriously inconvenienced," he said. "New streets, however, must be planned carefully. Only a long-range master plan can give reasonable assurance that all work undertaken will fit into the plan when completed."

Hubert E. Sargent, commissioner of highways for the State of Vermont, spoke on snow and ice control.

Rural communities, he said, now rely almost entirely upon highway transportation and their economic, social and educational activities are dependent upon uninterrupted highway use throughout the year. Any delay is cause for complaint.

He outlined snow removal work in Vermont where, he said, "the cost is high but there is no complaint by the taxpayers."

G. W. Tjupa, district highways engineer, New Brunswick, described snow removal methods in the northwest section of his Province, hilly country where seasonal snowfall ranges from 140 to 165 inches with 600 miles of road kept open.

He emphasized that continuous operation of machinery throughout a storm is essential, as well as adequate provision for relief of workers.

Because of low temperatures, there was little trouble from rain or slush. Wet snow was scraped off before it could freeze. All main trunk highways were sand or salted as well as hills on secondary roads. Sand boxes were provided for emergency use by motorists.

A special committee named to study the problem of grade highway-railway crossings and composed of deputy highways ministers of the various Provinces met at the close of today's sessions.

Musial Suffers First Big Slump Of Season

NEW YORK, Sept. 7 (AP)—Some National League pitchers won't believe it but Stan Musial is human, too. The great St. Louis Cardinal outfielder is suffering his first big slump of the season.

Musial lost 13 points during the last eight days including Monday's doubleheader when he went eight for nothing. He collected only four hits in 26 chances and dropped from .382 to .369.

Despite the nosedive, he still is far in front in his league's batting race. Teammate Country Slaughter maintained his .338 mark and his grip on second place. Alvin Dark, Boston's rookie shortstop, broke out of his own slump and moved up eight points, from .343 to .351, for fourth.

Others in the first 10 include, in order: Andy Pafko, Chicago, .330; Tommy Holmes, Boston, .325; Ed Walkus, Chicago, and Gene Hermanski, Brooklyn, .310 each; Jeff Heath, Boston, .305; and Sid Gordon, New York, .302.

The Pittsburgh veteran-rookie duo of Rip Sewell and Bob Chesnes paced the pitchers in the won-lost departments. Sewell has 10-3 for 7.69 and Chesnes, 12-4, for 7.50.

Close Race For Batting Honors In American League

CHICAGO, Sept. 7 (AP)—The torrid American League pennant race has its counterpart in the batting championship feud between Boston's Ted Williams and Cleveland's Lou Boudreau, separated by only three percentage points.

Williams, who at one or two junctures this season, threatened to run away with his fourth hitting title, today led Tribe boss Boudreau by only .370 to .367.

Other leaders through Monday's games were Al Zarilla, St. Louis, .325; Bob Dillinger, St. Louis, .319; Luke Appling, Chicago, .318; Hook Evers, Detroit, and Barney McCosky, Philadelphia, .313 each; Bill Goodman, Boston, .311; and Yogi Berra, New York, .309.

In the specialized departments, New York's Joe DiMaggio was a slugging standout last week. He slammed across 11 runs to swell his R.B.I. total to 128, and banged four homers for a season count of 33, thus holding the lead in both branches.

Boston's Jack Kramer headed the pitching column with 16 victories, a week's increase of two, against four setbacks for 800.

Aussie Sports Writers Critical Of Cup Captain

SYDNEY, Australia, Sept. 7 (AP)—Australian sports writers today bitterly criticized the Dominion's tennis administration and Davis Cup captain Adrian Quist.

One commentator called Quist "a champion sniveller and squealer."

Nettled by the 5-0 defeat at the hands of the United States in the cup challenge round, Australian writers demanded:

1. Encouragement of youngsters to build up a new cup team. 2. Overhaul of the Lawn Tennis Association of Australia.

The Sydney Daily Mirror in comment on the sports page blasted Quist harder than did Ted Schroeder and Frank Parker in the Davis Cup singles matches.

The Mirror snapped at Quist for objecting to criticism from Harry Hopman, veteran Australian Davis Cup star now in New York, that the team was the worst Australia ever sent to the United States.

The Mirror said Quist showed that "even if he was definitely finished as a Davis Cup player he was at least a champion sniveller and squealer."

The newspaper added that "snivelling at criticism and squealing under the lash of the news as Quist did on the eve of the Davis Cup matches, in which Australia was admittedly beaten to a frazzle, was the worst form ever shown by any Australian in international sport. It showed that Quist could not take it."

Three Sydney newspapers called for an overhaul of Australian tennis control.

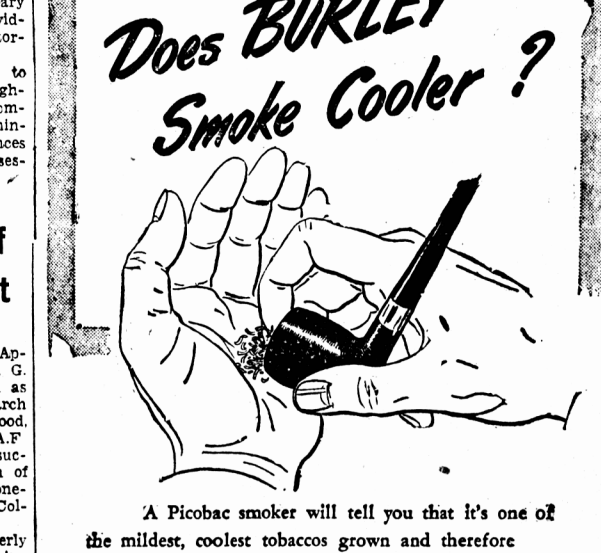

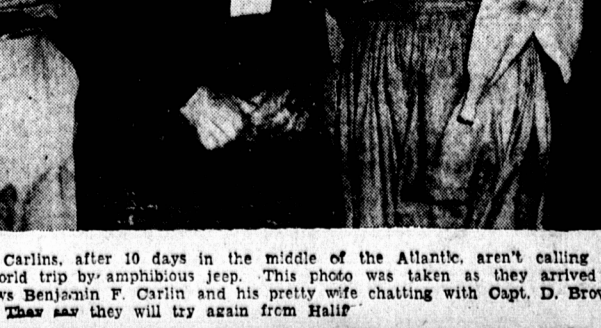
