**COLD STORAGE.**

That we need cold storage warehouses, is admitted and cold storage on the railway and the steamers plying between Charlottetown, Summerside and the Mainland. One link in the chain would be of little use until the chain is completed. We need to be able to store, or to send east and west meats, eggs, fruits and other products which require a moderately low temperature for their preservation. At Point du Chene or at Picotau we can connect with the cold storage cars of the Intercolonial. Until we have cold storage warehouses at our principal shipping ports, on the Island Railway and on the steamers plying to the mainland we shall be at a great disadvantage and our shipments of certain products must suffer damage before or during transportation.

It is to be noted that the arrangement entered into tentatively with the Dominion Packing Company does not provide for the completed chain which is required to give the Island the required facilities and security for cold storage. Moreover we have no stipulation as to the rates to be charged by the Packing Company for storage in its cold storage warehouses. This is a point of importance. Such warehouses would no doubt be of great advantage to the Company in their business, but if the Company are to be given a Government guarantee, it is vital that they shall be bound to give full accommodation to shipping men or firms—it may be their rivals in business—at reasonable rates and at all times, otherwise the latter will be wholly at the mercy of the monopoly in regard to cold storage.

This raises the question whether it would not be much better to have our cold storage warehouses, say at Charlottetown, Summerside, and Souris or Georgetown, in the hands of a separate company independent of the Dominion Packing Company or of any individual firm, so that all shippers requiring cold storage would be fully assured of fair and equal treatment and accommodation. A company could easily be formed on the Island for this purpose if the Government would give its guarantee of their bonds for a much less amount than it is proposed to guarantee for the Packing Company. This would be a safe undertaking and of undoubted benefit to many producing and shipping interests. Leave the meat packing and canning industries to private enterprise as they have been hitherto. In this way our present industry or enterprise would be endangered and all fear of monopoly would be removed.

Let the Government use its large influence with the Railway Department of the Federal Government to have cold storage or refrigerator cars placed on the Island Railway, and then we doubt not that the Seam Navigation Company could be induced to provide cold storage chambers on their boats, thus completing the chain of cool transportation east and west. It is along the lines above indicated or their equivalent that we think our Government might proceed with safety, with the general approval of all concerned and of the public generally. Such a course would certainly not arouse the storm of objection and disapproval which has been called forth by too hasty acceptance of the outside capitalists' proposal.

Many persons resident in Prince Edward Island, but who were either born in Scotland or are of Scotch descent, have been desirous to see the heather growing in the land of their adoption. It has been many times planted, or its seed sown here, but

its plants failed to grow, on the seed to germinate. The conclusion had been reached that the Island soil would not grow heather. But a year or two ago the six year old daughter of William Hunter of Hopeland, Alberton, himself a native of Scotland, found a pretty flowering plant growing on some waste land near their home and directed her parents' attention to it. They at once identified it as genuine Scottish heather. It appears that by some means unknown the seed had been dropped in that spot and grown. There are said to be three bunches within a circle of a few feet. The Guardian has been shown specimens of the Alberton heather and finds it indistinguishable in any respect from the heather of Scotland. The discovery is a highly interesting one.

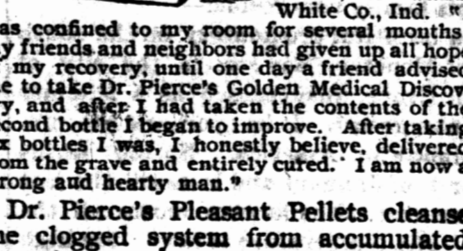
