Two popular Summerside visitors were in Charlottetown the past couple of days in the persons of Clifford Rogers and Jack Wright of the Dominion Silver Fox Farm, Limited.

Clifford Rogers, who was one of the first to respond to his country's call in the Great War and had an excellent record therein, is Vice-President of the Silver Fox Exhibitors Association of Prince Edward Island and in line for further honours.

As a result of tests made by Dr. John Jack of the Fox Experimental Farm the potency of males which proved that a certain polygamous male that had functioned splendidly as sire the previous year, on test proved impotent, the more forward breeders in Summerside and vicinity have equipped themselves with microscopes and test each mating.
