Teachers Local Convention

—The teachers of Tignish and vicinity met at the Dalton on Wednesday, Oct. 30, for their local convention. There was a good attendance.

The president, Mrs. Zulalia Gillis occupied the chair.

Following the President's address Mr. Dorgan, Supervisor, was called upon. He told the teachers to aim at better work in the elementary grades so as to have a more solid foundation on which to work in the advanced subjects.

Reverend J. A. MacDonald, parish priest of Tignish was the next speaker. He welcomed the teachers, wished them every success and asked God's blessing on their deliberations. He was followed by Supervisor Callahan who gave a very interesting and instructive talk on "Common failings of teachers."

The next speaker was Miss Estelle Bowness, president of the Teachers' Federation. She spoke on the Educational Campaign in P. E. I. and on the National Policy of the Canadian Teachers' Federation.

Miss Nora McCullough of the National Art Gallery spoke on the teaching of art, and illustrated her talk with pictures.

Mr. Chandler of the Film Board and Carnegie Libraries spoke on the help teachers may get from both in their work.

Afternoon Session

At the afternoon session, Mr. McPhail, attendance officer and director of correspondence course was the first speaker. He brought reports from Mr. L. W. Shaw, Director of Education for the province who was unable to be present, and in his remarks mentioned how the Family Allowance had boosted school attendance in P. E. I.

The next speaker Mr. Maurice Cahill of the Education Office spoke on the following: Time on account of sickness, nothing of engagement form, X-rays for teachers and monthly reports. Mr. McInnis of the Canadian Cancer Society then gave a short talk on "Educating people from fear of cancer." The other speakers for the afternoon were Mrs. Culmore who spoke on "First Aid"; Mrs. McCullum on "Junior Red Cross" and Miss Estelle Haines on "Nutrition." A pleasing feature of Mrs. McCullum's talk was the presentation to Miss Fairley Dorgan, teacher of Sea Cow Pond of an award for fifteen years service on behalf of the Junior Red Cross. Miss Bowness, president of the P. E. I. T. F. made the presentation.

Miss Richard, secretary, then read the questions submitted in the Question Box. These were answered by Mr. Cahill and Mr. McPhail.

The Resolutions Committee next gave its report after which the following officers were elected.
