**Corpus Christi Crushes Boom**

CORPUS CHRISTI, Tex., Nov. 6.—This is a town that paid \$30,000 for a boom and then deliberately killed the boom. But the newest port in the country has charged the \$30,000 up to valuable experience and thinks the money well spent.

Early in September Corpus Christi, which nestles beside the Gulf of Mexico, became Uncle Sam's latest port of entry and thereby got right down to business that event, however, it was among the boomiest spots on the American continent, all because an enterprising chamber of commerce had gone out in the highways and byways and invited everybody far and near to come settle in Corpus.

Was a \$30,000 Venture.

The chamber of commerce last winter spent \$30,000 on an advertising campaign to bring new residents to the city. About the time the paid invitations got well underway, messages began to pour in from "high powered and wide awake" real estate agents, and many of the agents soon followed their messages in person.

Almost before the city knew what was happening it was in the midst of an effervescent real estate stimulation. The town was inundated with wild-eyed boomers. Staid citizens who had never before thought of the thing called real estate began to talk it and breathe it. The hotel lobbies looked like a stock market on a busy day, as real estate was traded by a nod of the head, or a tense-voiced shout.

Then Built Up Solidly.

Soon the saner heads saw that it was mostly talk and paper trading and what they had wanted for \$30,000 was buildings and permanent residents. So they turned in to head off the boom.

The chamber of commerce began sending telegrams and letters to head off some of the prospective citizens. There was no boom in Corpus; Corpus didn't want a boom and didn't intend to have one. The boom was stopped.

It had lasted about two months and a half, and in that time Ralph Bradford, secretary of the chamber of commerce, estimated that \$8,000,000 worth of property was exchanged. The town got down to actual building. Two hundred houses and business buildings have been under construction the past summer, and in one month building permits reached \$320,000, which was considered good for a town of 25,000. The population increased 5,000 in 10 months.

**Indian War Hero Is Made U. S. Postman**

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9.—"Charges Alone," the full-blooded Archaic Indian of North Dakota who fully lived up to his name during the world war by killing or capturing ninety Germans single-handed, has had fulfilled his desire to be a letter carrier for Uncle Sam.

Through executive order, president Coolidge authorized his appointment without regard to civil service rules and Postmaster General New has proudly taken him in the war record of "Charges Alone" or Thomas Rogers as he is known by his Americanized name, won prompt appointment. He has been assigned to Mandan, N. D.

**Tribute Of Foch**

Marshal Foch when in North Dakota on his American trip picked Tom out of the crowd of Indians and placing his hand on his shoulder, cried out: "Tom Rogers was the bravest soldier in France."

Tom never talks about his war record but it is a noteworthy one. He was born at Fort Berthold, N. D., June 4, 1891, attended the same Neb. Indian State Normal School for six years and on August 1, 1917, enlisted in the Second North Dakota Regular Infantry. Arriving in France about November 17, 1917, he was assigned to the First Division with the Eighteenth Infantry, later being transferred to the Intelligence Section as observer-aider and sniper.

Let Tom's Major tell of his day:

**Was A Daring Scout**

"For three months prior to the Battle of Soissons, Tom, who was a scout, was sent out every night to the German front to get information as to what organization was here. His manner of getting the desired information was a novel one. A white lieutenant accompanied him as far as it was safe to go; Tom then went on alone to the front, creeping through the grass, bushes and weeds, and when a sentinel passed, captured him with his bare hands and took him back to the American camp where he was questioned. In case the sentinel attempted to give the alarm Tom 'croaked' him and carried his coat to camp. In ninety nights he was on this service, he did not make a single failure to bring in his man or a coat. He brought in thirty-three of the latter."

Tom was but one of the 12,000 Indians who served with the Americans during the war and of whom 132 were killed and 87 wounded. When President Coolidge sent the thanks of the Nation in the form of testimonials to the Indian tribes, Tom was designated to receive that for the Arikara Tribe.
