Deceased belonged to the same town as her husband, Morrisburg, Ont., they having been companions from childhood. Interment was made in City View Cemetery, Salem, Ore. 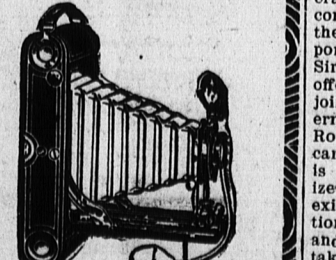

## RESPONSIBILITY OF THE LIBERALS

is a probability. The starting point of honest consideration of the present political crisis is frank recognition of the fact that Sir Wilfrid Laurier is inflexibly opposed to the compulsory enlistment of manpower, immediate or remote. His support of the referendum proposal in no way involved a relaxation of this attitude, since in the event of a referendum he would take the field in opposition to compulsion. "No one would deny Sir Wilfrid his right to hold these views and to champion them. Nevertheless, the consequences of the leader of one of our political parties taking such a position will be what they will be. It makes inevitable a new orientation in Canadian politics. Sir Wilfrid's insistence upon his own points of view without much regard for the feelings of a strong element in his own party makes inevitable a political revolution. The first fruits of the change was the division upon the second reading of the Military Service Bill. Le Soleil, of Quebec, a leading French Liberal newspaper, expresses its surprise at the vote. It admits its dismay over what it calls the defection of so many Liberal members. Its employment of this word reveals its state of mind. "It conceived this an ordinary political incident in which the authority of the leader would be obeyed in fact, of course, the twenty-six Liberals who voted for the bill are not to be charged with defection. The issue lies outside the orbit of parties. These members owe no allegiance to Sir Wilfrid on this issue, nor do the hundreds of thousands of Liberal electors outside the House who agree with their action.

Urged to Face Facts.

"When it is realized that the issue which split the Liberal party in Parliament will continue to the exclusion of all other issues, until the end of the war, it becomes apparent that the Liberal party is rent asunder in Parliament and in the country, and that there can be no basis for re-union. The people see this clearly, but from all accounts Liberal members at Ottawa and the official representatives of the party in the formal organizations are very reluctant to face the realities of the situation. They appear to think that this is only a summer shower, and that after it has passed they can come together, defeat the Tories and enter upon their kingdom. All this is delusion. They might better face the facts, unpalatable as they may be, than wait to have them knocked into their heads by an electorate that is clearer-headed and not so tender-hearted.

The Liberals of Canada also believe in compulsion. In overwhelming majority of the party in the English-Speaking Provinces today are dis-united and leaderless. They cannot follow Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Since this issue will persist, at least until the next election, they cannot hope for a reunion of the party. Obviously, they must get together in a new organization and under new leadership or they, in the coming election, will be crushed like eggshells between the Tory party, re-energized by a vigorous war policy, and the anti-compulsion party, which may profess to be the Liberal party, led by Sir Wilfrid Laurier. It is equally obvious that the only quarter from which effective leadership can come, at this moment, in the conscriptionist parliamentary party, which, judging by last week's vote, numbers 26 men, including, if we expect Sir Wilfrid, the leaders of the Liberal party as it was constituted. If they fail to act it may be necessary for the compulsion Liberals to try to deal with the situation by popular conventions, but this might come too late in view of the fact that a Dominion election is a certainty in the early future.

"The English conscription Liberals looked to the Parliamentary party adequately to voice their views in the discussion upon the military service bill, and they were not disappointed. Alike in the debate and in the division they were worthy representatives. They now look to the same men for patriotic and capable leadership in Parliament and out of it. The need is great and urgent if English Liberalism is not to be wrecked in Canada, to the great injury of the State.

"Once organized, the English Liberal party will be in a position to consider its position, and its duty to the country. It is persistently reported in the Conservative press that Sir Robert Borden is prepared to offer fair terms to such a party to join with them in the task of governing the country. At present Sir Robert Borden, if this be his desire, can make no proposal because there is no party to deal with. An organized Liberal group, if one were in existence, could receive a proposition if Sir Robert chose to make one, and they could accept it or reject it, taking in each case the responsibility of justifying their action to the people that their action was inspired by a regard to the public good. As matters are, however, conscriptionist Liberals are simply drifting with a strong current with Niagara roaring ahead."
