And now we are to have the Dreyfus case over again. New documentary evidence has turned up and an appeal has been granted.

Grover Cleveland in a letter to the Brooklyn Eagle has announced his "unalterable and conclusive determination" never again to be a candidate for the Presidency. Mr. Cleveland has been three times the candidate of the Democratic party and was twice elected, in 1884 and 1892. He was beaten by Harrison in 1888.

The Patriot desires to know what The Guardian thinks of the objection of Mr. Bell, M. P., to "the largely increased taxes on tobacco and spirits." We have much pleasure in replying that The Guardian has not objected, does not now object, and has no intention to make objection in the future to the taxes in question.

A surplus is the national treasury is surely not altogether a bad thing, and the Liberal party now appear to be proud of the fact that the surplus of this year is the largest in our history. But the fact remains that in time past so eminent and worthy a public man as Sir Richard Cartwright did object to the Conservative government having a large surplus. No doubt he has since changed his mind. Surpluses were not much in evidence during the period when he was Finance Minister, for those were the days of bad harvests, shrunken values and commercial depression.

The largest share holder in the strongest bank of the new world, the Bank of Montreal, is Sir William Macdonald, a native of Prince Edward Island. Sir William's shares at present market prices are said to be worth \$2,500,000.

Those seven branch railways were again brought to the front by Dr. Borden. That sort of thing belongs in the same category with certain surveys now going on, or about to be made with a view to gain the favorable notice of the electors in certain sections of the Island. Our electors do not usually pay much heed to that sort of thing, and show their wisdom in that way.

The death of George E. Casey, for 23 years the Liberal representative for West Elgin, is particularly sad. He entered politics at the age of 22 in 1872; a young man with considerable private fortune. When he was finally defeated in 1900 fortune and health were both gone. After long waiting he was able to secure a short time ago a subordinate clerkship in the library of Parliament and removed to Ottawa. There after two weeks illness from pneumonia he died a few days ago.

The Patriot tells of a prominent Conservative who remarked upon the time "when Sir John and Sir Charles crowded the rink" in Charlottetown. The Guardian is informed that Sir John Macdonald and Sir Charles Tupper never together addressed a political meeting in Charlottetown. Nor did Sir John at any time since confederation address a public meeting in Charlottetown. If this statement is wrong we shall be glad to publish a correction with dates and particulars. The matter is of some historic interest.

There are five or six thousand Mormons in Alberta, of whom Rev. J. D. Shearer in the Lord's Day Advocate gives a rather favorable account. He visited them in September last and tells that "these interesting people not only respect the Lord's Day and the laws and institutions of their adopted country, but are thorough-going prohibitionists and strongly opposed to all gambling institutions such as pool rooms. These qualities, combined with their plodding industry, should make them not only successful but faithful and loyal citizens."

The other day President Roosevelt visited New York to attend the funeral of his uncle. Great precautions were taken to secure his safety and 500 policemen were detailed for the purpose. This however did not prevent his coach being run into and nearly overturned, while on his way to the church. A harmless old man who by some means got through the guard and handed the President a letter was immediately arrested. His letter simply recommended charcoal as a remedy for the cure of the German Emperor's malady.

That strong Liberal journal the St. John Globe, speaking of the approaching visit of the Opposition leader to St. John, says:

Mr. Borden ought to receive a hearty welcome, and, no doubt, he will. The excellent qualities which he has displayed as leader of a great party are appreciated by both sides of the House of Commons, and there is on both sides confidence in his integrity, and the consciousness, too, that when he is called upon to lead the country—as he now leads the opposition—the control of affairs will be in the hands of an honorable man.

We regard it as an auspicious circumstance in the public life of Canada that both the party leaders enjoy the respect, not only of their own parties but of those opposed to them. This is true of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and of Dr. Borden. Both are able, clear, honorable and courteous public men. The breath of scandal has not touched either of these men personally.
