N. Y. Stock Market Cracked Last Week

(By William D. Morgan)
NEW YORK, July 18—(AP)—The stock market cracked wide open last week and prices plunged in the sharpest week-to-week decline in more than a year.
Wall Street's bull market took its first staggering blow on Thursday. On Friday another hard-hitting selling drive lashed at the market when it was still grossly from Thursday's pounding.
In two days approximately \$2,000,000,000 was chopped away from the market value of all securities listed on the stock exchange.
The bull market looked mighty shaky by the week-end. A lot of the experts, though, contended that a hopefully predicted summer advance would still develop.
One of the most noteworthy facts about the week's market was the absence of public participation on any scale.
Making its fourth consecutive Friday-to-Friday decline, the Associated Press composite of 35 wholesale commodity prices stood Friday at 189.29. This compared with 189.61 a week earlier and 182.52 a year ago. In the index the base year 1926 equals 100.
Components declining included grains and cotton and livestock. Industrials and food advanced.

Cull Piles Remain Blight Danger Source

The recent hot dry weather has removed the danger of late blight field infection for the present, but cull piles continue to be danger points and foci for later epidemics, says an advisory bulletin issued by Messrs. F. M. Cannon, Dominion Entomological Laboratory, and L. C. Callbeck, Dominion Laboratory of Plant Pathology. The sprouts in the cull pile near Charlottetown where active blight was found on July 2 have developed into young plants some of which have infected leaves.
Cull piles have been found on the premises of several warehouses on Prince Edward Island. These piles not only present an untidy appearance to the establishments but also may later cause local epidemics. The growers should insist on their removal.
Colorado potato beetle eggs are quite numerous this season. Many of them have hatched during the past week and unless an insecticide is applied within the next few days young larvae will cause considerable damage to the plants. DDT 50% used at the rate of 2 lbs. to 100 gallons of spray will give excellent control. DDT emulsion 1 quart to 100 gallons of spray or a 3% dust is also satisfactory.
The small black potato flea beetles which have been causing small holes in the leaves have almost all disappeared. The next brood of adults will not appear until early in August.

Shorthorn Breeders To Request Grant From Provincial Gov't.

Mr. R.R. Bell, K.C., was re-elected President of the Prince Edward Island Shorthorn Breeders' Association at the annual meeting of the organization held in the City Hall Saturday evening. Other officers elected were Messrs. Athol Roberts, Southport, vice-president; and Sterling Wood, Mount Herbert, secretary-treasurer.
Other directors elected were Messrs. Seymour Wood, Mount Herbert, Houlton Mutch, Earncliffe; John DuPasquier, Dundas; Eric Lowther, Crapaud; Austin Smith, Victoria; and John Crosby, Meadowbank.

Approximately 50 per cent of the demands on the insemination unit had been for the services of the two Shorthorn bulls, Mr. Bell said.

New Wage Boost For Steelworkers In United States

CLEVELAND, July 18—(AP)—The new wage increase for steelworkers, higher coal costs and increased freight rates will push steel prices up soon, although producers are waiting for United States steel to set the pattern, the magazine Steel reported today.
One company, important in alloy production, raised its steels five per cent, the magazine said, and a leading merchant iron producer boosted pig iron prices \$4 a gross ton within the last week. However, steel said these composite prices were unchanged from the previous week.
\$80.27 for finished steel, compared with \$68.82 a ton in the like week of 1947, and \$88.62 a ton for semi-finished steel, compared with \$52.10 a ton a year ago.
Steel ingot production edged up 1 1/2 points last week to 90.3 per cent of capacity, the magazine reported. The production was equivalent to 1,700,000 tons of ingots and castings.
Steelmaking scrap, selling a year ago for \$36.08 a ton, rose last week from \$40.87 to \$40.83, the summary said. The vacation season, reduced mill shipments of steel to scrap-generating plants and a slackening of scrap collection during harvest season were listed as reasons for the current smaller scrap flow.

Trouble Bubbles Behind the Iron Curtain

Rumors have long been current that all is not well with Russia and some of her satellites. Yugoslav crisis and wave of purges and attempted purging sweeping out from Moscow supports these rumors.

German Red leader demands purge of "diversionists" from party. Issues call to arms against "underground activity" of anti-Marxist Socialists. In Hungary, CP gets drastic housecleaning. Central Committee warns party adherents not to stray from Moscow line.

Purge of prominent Romanian Communists reported. Their "crimes" the same as those cited against Marshal Tito. Cominform headquarters believed moved from Belgrade to Bucharest.

Bulgarian Reds approve Cominform denunciation of Yugoslavia. Yugo Communists blast Bulgarians for endorsing the "unprincipled lies" of "rightist Premier Georgi Dimitroff, Tito's rival for Balkan leadership.

Communist crisis in Balkans sparked by Comintern's denunciation of Tito regime. Tito returned bitterly and fueled the fire by proposing Yugo-Bulgarian-Albanian Federation—a union which Moscow scoldingly rejected when Bulgaria's Dimitroff offered it in January.

Yugo-Russian split may benefit Greece. Yugoslavia, under Moscow direction, recruits, arms and trains Red guerrillas to fight in Greece. Yugo-Russian collaboration is essential to any sustained offensive by Greek Red forces.

Map highlights fast-moving developments in Russia's bloc of East European satellite states, following the Comintern's startling action in reading Marshal Tito and Yugoslavia's top Communist leadership out of the party.

EQUALIZE TAX

VICTORIA, B.C. — (CP) — A three-man assessment equalization board to bring school tax assessments into line in the province's 70-odd school districts has been set up by the British Columbia government. The board's decisions will be final.
