3,500 PERSONS IN CANADA WROTE CIVIL SERVICE EXAMS

OTTAWA, Nov. 28.—Seven hundred candidates are writing on the examinations being held in Ottawa for positions in the civil service as clerks and stenographers. This is a record. The majority of those writing on the papers are returned soldiers. Quite a number of these are already in temporary government positions. The examinations are being held today from coast to coast under the direction of Mr. R. A. Barril, chief clerk in examination branch of the civil service commission. Thirty five hundred persons are writing in Canada.

ARANMORE SAILED.—The C. G. S. Aranmore sailed yesterday morning at 6 o'clock for Belle Isle Strait with light house supplies. She carried at Georgetown at noon for some firemen and left there at 4 p.m. She takes a full cargo for the light house keepers, including cattle, horses, sheep and poultry.

LAI D TO REST.—The funeral of the late Mr. Reaney Gay took place yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock and was an exceptionally large one. Rev. THE CANADIAN ADVENTURER.—The new steamship the Canadian Adventurer arrived in Charlottetown on Saturday morning from St. John's, Nfld. She is now loading cargo at the railway wharf and will take part of her cargo at Bruce Stewart & Co's. wharf. The Canadian Adventurer is a steamer of 1200 tons net. She is a brand-new ship having only been launched a few weeks ago at Collingwood, the Prince of Wales officiating at the ceremony. She took a cargo of wheat to Montreal and then a cargo of flour to St. John's, Nfld., and from St. John's she came to Charlottetown to take a full cargo of general produce to Newfoundland. She is a splendid steamer and a credit to Canadian workmanship. She will likely leave here on Wednesday.

GREATLY STRUCK WITH ABOUNDING PROSPERITY THROUGH-OUT CANADA

MONTREAL, Nov. 28.—Having just completed a tour of Canada as far as the Pacific coast, which included 27 cities, Harrison Watson, Canadian Trade Commissioner, in London, and senior of the commissioners in England was in Montreal Monday on the eve of embarking on the Empress of France which sails from Quebec today.

Mr. Watson, who has been revisiting Canada after eight years absence, said he was greatly struck with the abounding prosperity of the country as a whole. He had visited France, Belgium, and Holland since the war, and none of the European countries could show anything like Canada in the amount of food and other comforts.

In fact this very prosperity, said Mr. Watson, rather hindered the promotion of Canadian export trade to Great Britain, for he had come across manufacturers in the course of his tour who had been eager to get orders from Berlin a year ago, who today were regretting having accepted them, as they found they could command higher prices here.

The same applied to orders for such countries as Greece and Rumania. He had, however, impressed upon Canadian manufacturers that they could not hope to hold the British market unless they catered for it in a regular and systematic manner. **CHEERED FOR FORMER EMPEROR**

BERLIN, Nov. 27.—The presence of General Ludendorff, former first quartermaster general, in the imperial pew of the Potsdam garrison church, Monday, during a memorial service for Germans who fell in battle, was the occasion for a striking demonstration. General Ludendorff spoke of military training as an invigorating and moral education.

One of the congregation, dressed in a field grey uniform, rose and exclaimed: "When the hour comes we will all follow you, General," whereupon the whole congregation stood and sang "Deutschland über Alles." In the course of his sermon the preacher said:

"When the time comes we shall die bravely for our brothers and our honor, and not disgrace ourselves." At the close of the sermon the preacher, standing on the tomb of Frederick the Great, summoned the congregation to unite in creating a monarchy which would be supported by the will of the people. General Ludendorff was given an ovation as he left the building, and cheers also were raised for former Emperor William.

**WIFE OF TOM THUMB DIES AT AGE OF 77**

MIDDLEBORO, Mass., Nov. 28.—Countess Primo Magri, known to the general public as Mrs. Tom Thumb, and one of the best known Lilliputians in the world, died at her home here after a long illness. She was 77 years old and had travelled around the world several times under the management of the late P. T. Barnum. Countess Magri was the daughter of James S. and Hulda Bump. Count Magri, her husband survives. One of the world's most famous dwarfs, Mrs. Tom Thumb, who was correctly but less popularly known as the Countess Magri, measured only 22 inches in height. She weighed only 39 pounds. Born in Middleboro, Mass., 77 years ago, she outlived all the professional associates of her generation. Her first husband, General Tom Thumb, has been dead for 37 years. Her sister, also a dwarf still smaller, died 42 years ago. The parents were of large stature and numerous children born to them, with two exceptions, were of normal size. At birth Lavina Warren, for such was Mrs. Thumb's maiden name, weighed six pounds and at the age of one year she was of normal size. For the next nine years she grew slowly and then suddenly stopped altogether. At 70 her hair was still jet black, and fine black eyes sparkled from a full round dimpled face, and her voice was always soft and sweet. Her public career occupied 56 eventful years. During this time she travelled over the civilized world and had been introduced to nearly every crowned head and eminent person in every country she visited. Accumulating a large fortune, Mrs. Thumb made her farewell tour in 1912. Her second husband, Count Magri of Italy, is also a dwarf.
