PANIC AVERTED CROWDED CHURCH

YORK, Me., June 17-With over 600 persons crowded within the old First Congregational church during the graduating exercises of the York-shire school this evening a serious accident was narrowly averted when the floor in the vestibule and rear of the vestry sank four inches. Thos. Lawson Page, the author, a summer resident of this town, was addressing the graduates when the accident happened and there was not the slightest panic. Mr. Page finished his address when the announcement was made that a slight accident had happened and the audience was requested to leave the building quietly at the conclusion of the exercises. Then the programme was continued after which the people dispersed quietly two by two without any mishaps or signs of a panic. Few of the people in the vicinity seemed to realize fully the nature of the accident but some foreseeing the nature of the accident before the floor could give away any further hurried to the basement with the janitor and propped up the flooring with additional timbers. It was decided that the temporary supports were sufficient to prevent any further collapse and the officials in charge thought it best not to interrupt the programme.

PRESBYTERIAN GEN'L ASSEMBLY

WINNIPEG, June 16. - Local opinion and the abolition of the part were endorsed unanimously. The suggestion that there should be no shop licenses unless a majority of the ratepayers of a municipality petitioned for them, was adopted after considerable discussion and with a dissenting. Those who dissented held that this was a compromise with evil, and that the assembly should stand for straight prohibition. The work of the Dominion and Provincial Lord's Day Alliance was approved and commended to the earnest practical sympathy of the Church. A resolution was passed that the General Assembly views with alarm the practical results of Sabbath Day legislation in the province of British Columbia, and expresses its hope that the government of that province will adopt a policy in regard to the enforcement of the Lord's Day Act, more in accordance with the true object of that legislation, and the practice of other provinces. The last of the business on the order paper was of a non-contentious nature, and was put through during the evening session. The assembly then closed its labors for the year, parting benediction being pronounced by Principal Gordon, of Queen's.

TRIAL DRAWING NEAR ITS CLOSE

Expected That the Second Trial of Alonzo Dougherty Will be Completed To-day-The Evidence All In Yesterday Afternoon-Counsel Expected to Address and Judge to Charge Jury To-day.

In the Supreme Court at Summerside yesterday morning the Dougherty murder trial was continued. The first witness was Donald McCallum, whose evidence was given in the former trial. Questioned by Mr. McQuarrie, witness was asked what Dr. Beairto said about the effect of the injury. Mr. Johnston objected on the ground of hearsay evidence. Mr. McQuarrie contended that this was an exception to the rule of hearsay evidence, also that the declaration of Mr. Johnston maintained this was only a matter of opinion; and the Court sustained the objection.

Alonzo Dougherty, the prisoner was the next witness. His evidence was practically the same as that given at the first trial. Referring to the tragedy: He thought he saw some object before him, then saw McMillan lying on the ground. He thought he heard a shot. Then he said "Stella, I think Joe is dead."

Cross examined by the Attorney-General-Last summer Stella and I and some difference, also later on I asked to come home to see Stella with her, and she refused. On Sunday the 10th, I saw Stella in the evening. I also saw her in the afternoon, when I went home to tea, I took a handkerchief out of my pocket also the revolver-There was no particular reason why I took the revolver in his hand and take it over to the foreman of the jury and show how he would discharge it. This was accordingly done. Dougherty was unable to make it work with one hand and stated that the revolver was not in as good condition as when he had had possession of it at the time of the tragedy.

He claimed it was rusty. I don't remember telling anyone I was going along the railway with my head down. I told Dr. Jardine from statements made to me by Stella that McMillan was shot in the stomach and the head. I do not remember telling anyone else about shooting him in the stomach and the head. My recollection of the discovery of the body is that it was lying across the track with the head on the south side, the body between the rails. I recognized the body as that of Joe McMillan. I did not see Stella after I had seen the body. I then saw Stella standing some distance back of me and to one side. I told Stella Joe must be lying there and the body lying there and I had a revolver in my hand. I concluded there must be some connection between Joe and the revolver. I did not ask Stella what had happened. The only reason I had in taking the body off the track was that the trial might run over it. As far as I know the hat remained on his head. This concluded his evidence.

DR. JARDINE was the next witness. His direct examination was about the same as at the former trial, and lasted till dinner hour. At the afternoon session the cross-examination of Dr. Jardine was continued by the Attorney General-I am not able to classify his action while on the rail track, but would say that his action during the time of the shooting was that of impulsive insanity in conversation with him in his cell I think he said on one occasion that he had a faint recollection of aiming at his breast, but he could not remember doing so. To the jury-I would not say he is insane now. Dr. Conroy, examined by Mr. McQuarrie-Insanity is a hereditary disease. In a person predisposed to insanity a trifling cause would lead to insanity. In a case where a crime was committed under impulsive insanity I would look for a motive or cause for the crime, and if these causes could not be connected with the crime I would then look for insanity, and would look at the hereditary line of the person. A person committing an act during impulsive insanity would not remember committing such an act.

A man predisposed to insanity may be made insane by a very trifling thing. A trifling cause, such as religion, jealousy or anything that excites the mind might cause a disturbance of the mind-I cannot say that from personal examination made on the prisoner that he is insane now. Drs. McLellan and Sutherland next gave evidence of a similar nature. The Attorney-General then asked leave of the Court to re-open the prosecution to introduce some evidence on the insanity plea. The evidence of Dr. Goodwill was of the same nature as that given by him at the previous trial. In answer to a question from the judge-From a personal examination of the prisoner I would not say that the prisoner is insane now or that I think he ever was insane. Cross-examined by Mr. McQuarrie-Assuming that the statement of the prisoner is true, that he was unconscious, and knows nothing of the shooting, I would not say that it was not the act of an insane man; also assuming that the statement of the prisoner that he knows nothing of the shooting; that there is no motive and that he has nothing against the deceased would not look like the act of a sane man. Some pretty warm debate took place between the prisoner's counsel and the witness.

Dr. Johnston examined by the Attorney-General-Assuming that the whole statement of the prisoner as told by him is true I would not say that he was insane. Cross-examined by Mr. McQuarrie-Assuming that the statement of the prisoner was true as told by him that he did not know anything about the shooting, I would not say that this was not insanity. A person acting under impulsive insanity would be conscious after the act. To the jury-From my personal examination, made of the prisoner as he is now, I cannot say that the prisoner is not insane, or ever was in an insane condition. Dr. Warburton examined by the Attorney-General-Assuming that the whole statement of the prisoner as told by him is true I would not say that he was insane.

Nothing but the splendid and highly commendable work and promptness of the Charlottetown Fire Brigade averted a disastrous fire last evening. About 6.20 p. m. Sixtus McLellan was working in his tailoring shop next Jenkins & Son's grocery establishment on the corner of Grafton and Queen Street, both firms being joint occupants of the large wooden building, was notified by some of his employees on the third floor where the tailors workshop is situated that there was smoke coming up through the floor. Mr. McLellan at once ran up stairs stopping on the way at a lavatory on the second floor. This lavatory affords a view, through a window, of the second floor which was used by Jenkins & Son as a store room. As soon as he opened the door of the lavatory Mr. McLellan saw flames shooting up to the ceiling. He is not certain whether they were in the lavatory or further over in the store room. At any rate he lost no time in running to the Police Station a block away, and giving the alarm. It was very fortunate that the fire was discovered just then several firemen were on the street, when the first peal was struck by the bell. They ran to headquarters and as soon as Mr. McLellan had returned to his shop a line of hose was laid and the water was turned on. The Chief quickly arrived and rapidly had one stream after another added till at last seven lines of hose were in operation. The firemen first reached the scene Jenkins & Son's place was looked, the proprietor and clerks having just gone home to tea. The firemen broke through and got the water to work. Simultaneously the Salvage Corps got to work and began to remove the goods from both stores. An immense throng of people had gathered and a volunteer brigade was soon added to the Salvage Corps. Express wagons were procured loaded by willing hands and the goods taken away to places of safety near the harbor. The boys were particularly active in helping little men, and behaving in a manner that can be referred to with pride. Mr. Jenkins who was summoned from his home and arrived during the progress of salvage says that there was not an attempt on the part of any of the helpers to pilfer anything and he is greatly obliged to all who assisted to remove his goods especially the boys. Mr. McLellan is equally grateful for similar assistance. The fire burnt furiously eating through the upper floor but the firemen soon conquered it. If they had not won a speedy victory the tale would have been one of great loss. They simply drowned the fire out, and from the Chief down all worked with a will that was the subject of the trial.
