Ch'Town Athlete Earns Place On Acadia Lineup

Ivan "Hickey" Nicholson Speedy Freshman Of The Varsity Squad Replaces Jack Buckley Star Centre Quarter—Big Game With Dal' Today.

WOLFVILLE, Oct. 26.—A radical shift is to be made in the Acadia backfield for the big game with Dalhousie this afternoon. Following the last intensive workout of the Varsity squad this afternoon, Coach Fred Kelly announced that Ivan Nicholson, speedy freshman, will replace Jack Buckley, star right centre three-quarter for the past two years and that Buckley will be shifted to the fullback position, displacing Laurie, who held down that job in the Dalhousie and United Services games.

Nicholson, who hails from Charlottetown, won his promotion to the Varsity team by his spectacular showing in this afternoon's practice. Playing on the intermediate line-up he climaxed a number of sensational rushes with a dash through the whole Varsity outfit for the first score that the scrubs have made this season. Shifted later on by the Acadia mentor to the Varsity, he promptly repeated the same stunt against his former team mates.

RECORD FOR EARLY SEASON IN HOCKEY

The Intermediate Football Title Goes To P. W. C's

Defeated Saint Dunstons Yesterday By 3 To Nil Score—Penalty Kick Against Red And White Results In Winning Count.

Prince of Wales College football squad won the Intermediate championship of Prince Edward Island yesterday by defeating Saint Dunstons 3 to 0 in a game, for the most part lacking real championship football and far inferior to that which was played between these teams two weeks ago. Kicking was the all important feature in the tussle which both teams resorted to with a will, and strange to say it was a well placed kick that earned for the red and blue a hard fought football title.

After playing Prince of Wales into the ground in the first half, but lacking the punch to score, Saint Dunstons, for some unknown reason suffered a reversal of form in the final session, which forced them into a kicking game in order to stop the furious onslaughts of Prince of Wales.

It was Filler, fast and hard kicking red and blue half back who broke what looked like a certain deadlock. Fifteen minutes from the opening second half whistle, P. W. C's were awarded a penalty kick on the Saint Dunstons 25 yard line. Filler chosen for the job, fulfilled his task magnificently. Taking a drop kick from said 25 yard line, he booted the ball over the bar for three points, and at the same time executing one of the best kicks ever seen on the Abegweit grounds. This was the only score of the game. Saint Dunstons tried hard in the dying moments of the fixture to even the count, but try as they may, there was nothing doing. Prince of Wales had the lead and they meant to keep it.

As above mentioned, yesterday's game was practically featureless. The University team played better football in the back lanes, but P. W. C's easily made up for this by hard tackling and great following up of long punts and dribbles.

NO CHANGES ARE FIGURED IN LINE UP

FREDERICTON, Oct. 25.—The University of New Brunswick Rugby team held a light workout yesterday afternoon under Coach Burden at College Field. The team was shifted around after the game with Mount Allison, several changes being made in the line-up during the practice. It is not expected, however, that the team will be changed for the MacTier Cup game with Caledonia here on Saturday. Captain Dick Pette, who has been out with a sore arm since first game here with Fredericton City, may be back in the scrum, but it is not regarded as probable.

The Caledonians come here backed by a formidable scoring record. A fast game is expected as it is reported that the two teams play a very similar style of game.

The referee has not yet been selected. Rev. Dr. Boyle, of Antigonish was suggested, but he is unable to officiate.

If successful here Caledonia will play at Montreal in defense of the cup on November 2. If U. N. B. wins the Montreal game will probably not be played until a week later.

"Iron Man" Joe McGinnity, who has been fighting a losing battle for some time against the dreaded cancer disease, lived up to his name as late as May 11, 1925, when at Ottumwa, Illinois, he won a game of baseball at the age of 34 against John Welch, an 18-year-old hurler, by a score of 7 to 3. Soon afterwards he resigned as manager of the Dubuque club of the Mississippi Valley League and sold his interest in that club. McGinnity gained a place in the list of baseball's immortals when he was a team-mate of the late Christy Mathewson. In 1904 he set the modern record of 51 games pitched in a major league season and in 1905 he pitched one of the five shuter games in the World's series of that year, Mathewson pitching three shutouts and Chief Bender one and the New York Giants winning the series, four games to one—all shut-outs. McGinnity's last connection with baseball was as coach and scout for Brooklyn in 1927.
