LORD BYNG PRAISES WOMANHOOD

TORONTO, Dec. 1.-His Excellency Lord Byng, addressing the Women's Canadian Club here yesterday, said he was inclined to think that a woman's verdict on a man was generally better than a man's verdict of a woman. He humorously characterized Sir Walter Scott's "Oh Women, in our hours of ease, uncertain, coy and hard to please," as a "dreadful nonsense" and in substantiation of this declared the women were neither uncertain or coy, and as to women being hard to please, he had only to look at some of his contemporaries who had been married for some years to realize that this was not correct either. His Lordship urged upon the ladies the need of constructive imagination being in the development of Canada imaginative construction was required, he said.

He emphasized the unity of effort. "The war was won by unity of efforts," Lord Byng said. "It seems rather a pity that we should have gone back to the multitude of well intentioned organizations, which seem to overlap and cut each other's throats." Lord Byng, referring to invitations to him to become Governor-General of Canada, included invitation from the ladies, said he needed no pressing invitations to accept that high office. "I am Canadian to my marrow," he added, and paraphrasing the language of "one of the earliest lady romantics," "Ruth," he said, "Your ways shall be my ways, your people shall be my people, and your country shall be my country."

Mr. Balfour To Visit Canada

WASHINGTON, Dec 1.-Hon. A. J. Balfour, head of the British Empire delegation to the Washington Conference has been deluged with invitations to visit Canada since his arrival in Washington. The messages have come to the British headquarters here from a score or more of Canadian cities requesting the famous British statesman and orator to speak at meetings and banquets of Canadian Clubs and various other organizations, it was learned by the Canadian Press tonight that Mr. Balfour will not be able to accept any of these invitations until after the close of the Conference. It is known, however, that Mr. Balfour has expressed the wish that he would like if it were possible to go to Canada and it is not impossible that he may visit a number of places in the Dominion before returning to the Old Country at the conclusion of the big international meeting here. Mr. Balfour will leave on Saturday night for New York where he will attend several public functions on Monday and Tuesday and he will return to Washington on Wednesday.

Premier Accepts No Invitations

LONDON, Dec. 1.-A letter sent to United States Papilists at the instigation of Mr. Lloyd George says the Prime Minister will be in Washington for a fortnight only or three weeks at the longest and that he will be obliged to devote his entire time to the Conference hence he will be unable to accept many kind invitations received through their delegations.

Patron Saint of Scotland Honored

Scottish Blood Passport to Canadian Welcome, Said Rev. George Duncan

OTTAWA, Nov. 30.-Officers of St. Andrew's Society, and the Calendonian Society, were present at the annual St. Andrew's service held at the Church of St. Andrew and St. Paul Sunday evening. The Rev. George Duncan, D. D., preached the sermon, the beginning of which he devoted to the patron saint of Scotland. In the four views to be had of St. Andrew, Dr. Duncan pointed out that "He is a man of flesh and blood and soul, such as a Scot must have for his representative ideal."

In the four glimpses from the Holy Book, the preacher said Saint Andrew had demonstrated exactly those characteristics of the Scotsman for which that nation is noted. Andrew had shown his utter open-mindedness in leaving home, prospects and trade, realising that Jesus was his Master, but he had kept his individuality. Another trait of the Apostle's character was his quiet mode of preaching. He never forced his views on others; never dictated. He shrinks from self-advertisement; patrons suit of the flashlight, and quietly pursues the line of his own conviction and loyalty. When Andrew asked in a quiet way what five loaves and two little fishes were among so many, he betrayed his practical, commonsense resourcefulness, as well as a sense of humor. In the last glimpse of St. Andrew he counsels caution when Christ spoke of the destruction of the Temple; caution lest the authorities misunderstand it, and regard it as the threat of an anarchist and revolutionary.

New Rules For Railways

CHICAGO, Dec 1.-A decision recognizing the open shop principle as applied to the railroads and promulgating 148 new working rules to govern the six federated railroad shops crafts, will be handed down by the United States labor board tomorrow. The decision which supplants the national agreement entered by the employees with the United States railroad administration will form the ground work on which the adjudication of all future wage disputes between railroads and their employees will be based. The ruling opens the way for the railroads to ask for lower wages for the shop crafts employees, the labor board having announced that it would consider no further wage reductions for any class of employees until working rules for that class have been disposed of. The new rulings will affect approximately 400,000 employees and become effective immediately. When normal conditions are restored it is estimated that fully 450,000 men will be affected and the railroads will have an annual payroll saving of approximately \$50,000,000.

Whenever delay, to or mis-delivery of a letter occurs, the sender of the address it is prone to adversely criticize the Post Office. Frequently, however, the delay or mis-delivery is due to the carelessness of the public, in failing to properly address the mail matter in question. During three days this month, 133,300 pieces of incorrectly and insufficiently addressed mail matter were handled at the large letter Post Offices. This is a daily average of 48,800 for the 55 offices, or at the rate of 16,000,000 for a year of 365 days. Think of the number of postal clerks engaged in handing this mis-directed

ed mail, who could, if the general public, were more careful, be used to give better service in other lines! Much trouble is due to careless writing, to the use of a pencil in writing the address, and to failure to give the proper street address or to keep mailing lists up to date. With the Christmas season at hand, bringing immense quantities of mail to be dealt with, it will be necessary that the public adopt more careful methods in the preparation of its mail matter, if the daily average of mis-directed mail is not to amount to an overwhelming figure. In this connection the following points to be observed are pointed out: Prepay postage fully; Address plainly and fully; Place name and address of sender on all mail matter; Carefully pack and wrap all articles sent by parcel post, but do not seal the parcels as sealed parcels are subject to letter rate of postage; Mail Christmas parcels early; Insure valuable parcels.
