The Saint John Telegraph Journal pays the following tribute to Fred Kelly coach of Acadia Intercollegiate rugby champions.

"Acadia University's gridiron men now Maritime Intercollegiate champs for 1936, will be hailed within the next few days, as a powerful aggregation, which they must have been to defeat the crack Mount A squad at Truro yesterday afternoon. But what about the old time stager, their coach Fred Kelly, whose name has been so popular in Maritime sporting circles for the past 20 years?

"Fred Kelly, or 'Kel', to all those to have been privileged to know him, is the man who breathed organization, training and spirit into that 15 who wore the 'Bluenoses' jerseys into the championship tilt. He's done so for years always producing a clean team which won or lost a good fight.

"Kel' is the same fellow who has put Acadia University on the sporting map with the track and field team which has cleaned up Maritime honors for almost a decade, his wins being all in a row. He's more of a sporting sculptor who fashions a mobile machine from raw materials, and his success has not been small.

"Years ago when the famous Abegweit hockey squad of Prince Edward Island, thrilled fans and went through to victories unended, Fred Kelly was the youthful captain. Today, Acadia University should be proud to have such experience and good sportsmanship rolled into an instructor who can and does get the boys to perform—and they like it!"

"Kel' who with his wife spends the summer months at Brighton shore and who is quite active in local tennis circles will find his host of friends and admirers in this city and province heartily endorsing the above tribute and extending congratulations to him, the team and the University."

Burleigh Grimes Succeeds Stengel As Manager Of Brooklyn Dodgers Club

BROOKLYN, N. Y., Nov. 5 — (AP) — Tempestuous Burleigh Grimes today came back to his old fighting grounds as manager of Brooklyn Dodgers.

Stormy petrel of the Dodgers' pitching staff from 1918 through 1928, manager of the seventh-place Louisville (A.A.) club last year, Grimes was given a one-year contract to succeed Casey Stengel.

The announcement was made by President Stephen McKeever through John Gorman, business manager of the club. Gorman refused to name Grimes' salary but said it was "considerably more than \$7,500."

Gorman said Ray Blades, manager of the Rochester Club last year, was the only other man seriously considered. He added that neither Joe Stripp nor Babe Ruth was considered.

Grimes was not here when the announcement was made. He said in St. Louis he would have "the best hustling team in the National League."

Grimes, "tough guy" of the League in the 1920's, is considered one of the few men popular enough to console the Brooklyn fans for the loss of Stengel.

Beloved in Brooklyn for his pitching and aggressiveness, his gruff swaggering manner and his habit of dusting the batter off, Burleigh, now 43, spent 22 years in the majors with eight clubs. In his nine years here he won 157 games and lost 121 for a team that was generally in the second division.

The Same Man

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 5—(AP)—There ought to be much rejoicing in Flatbush tonight—surely, snappy, scrappy Burleigh Grimes is coming back to the Dodgers and he's coming back fighting.

He looks more like the well-dressed business man now than he did back in the days when he hurled his spitball for "Uncle Robbie," but appearances are deceiving. Grimes is still Grimes, even though his jaw seldom sports the stubble of his pitching days.

"I'm going to give Brooklyn a hustling ball club," he said. "I don't know how good we'll be, whether we'll win a lot of games or not, but I can tell you it will be the kind of scrappy ball club that Brooklyn fans and all other fans like."

He admitted he would like to have Dizzy Dean, the Cards' star pitcher and chief gasser.

"I'll take Dizzy Dean for mine, any time we can get him," he said. "And I could handle him, too."

Amerks And Black Hawks Play Draw

CHICAGO, Nov. 5—(A. P.)—The legally-embroidered New York Americans and Chicago Black Hawks battled to a 1-1 overtime tie at the Chicago Stadium tonight to open the National hockey league season before 13,000 spectators.

Both goals came in a fast, rough second period. Bill Kendall, on a fast pass from Louis Trudel, put the Hawks in front after nine minutes of play in the stanza. Less than six minutes later Harry Oliver knotted the count with Lloyd Jackson getting an assist.

The fight for control of the Americans being waged between the League and the club's ousted owner, William Dwyer, failed to prevent the visitors from battling the Hawks on even terms through the game in which 11 penalties were called.

In the final overtime session John Gallagher of the Americans missed a penalty shot awarded when Alex Levinsky interfered with Dave Schirner.

About two weeks ago the National League took over the Americans franchise. Wednesday, an order obtained from a judge at Whitby Ont., was served on the Americans, restraining them from playing under the auspices of the National League as a result they played tonight under the name of the New York Americans Hockey Club, of which Dwyer was president.

Attorney John Shelleck, representing Dwyer, said the club is willing and able to meet its financial obligations but Frank Calder, President of the National League, said other club representatives would have to study the situation before a final decision is reached.

The injunction which compels use of the name—New York Americans Hockey Club—at least until set aside, has no effect on the gate receipts question. Visiting teams do not share in receipts.

Kelly Scores As Red Wings Defeat Leafs

MAPLE LEAF GARDENS
TORONTO, Nov. 5—(CP)—Just as they ruined Stanley cup hopes hereabouts last spring, Detroit's Champion Red Wings spoiled the National Hockey League opening tonight for Toronto Maple Leafs by winning 3-1 over the home forces.

The king of professional hockey looked regal only in the third period, but they got in sufficient blows during this session to flatten the Leafs and wreck completely Walter Broda's ambition of starting his big-league career with a shutout.

Trailing 1-0, having been pretty thoroughly outplayed, the Red Wings attacked all the way through the final stanza and scored three times on the Rookie Leaf goal tender, once on a blueline shot that dribbled through the 21-year-old netman's shin pads.

Buzz Boll scored the only goal in the first period, sniping in a pass from Bill Thoms. Harvey Jackson, the game's real star, and Sylvanus Apps, amateur star of Hamilton Tigers last sea on, carried the battle to the Champions through the second without scoring.

But the Wings tied the score when Bucko McDonald put a goalmouth pass on Syd Howe's stick and seven seconds later Larry Aurie beat Broda from the blue line. Near the finish Pete Kelly made the opening more disappointing than ever for 8,462 fans by banging in a rebound from Wally Kilrea's shot.

The game was slow and not particularly interesting most of the time.
