Unrest and its Antidote

Sir—In a recent issue of the Guardian, under the title "Success," there appeared an editorial of rare wisdom in these perplexing times of unrest. Nowadays, when almost the entire press of the country is absorbed in politics and many ostensibly respectable newspapers, whose weight and influence might play a noble part in the life of the nation, confine their greatest genius to the service of a cause that is often suspicious and always, as things are, grossly material. It is refreshing to find a daily journal devoting some of its attention to abstract and irrelevant matters such as a mere disinterested enquiry concerning the ethics of success. With the philosophy of the article in question I quite agree, and if you will be so far indulgent, I may state one of the thoughts which your views have prompted.

It is true that success, in the vulgar conception of its meaning, is the attainment of wealth or coveted position regardless of any inconvenient questions of moral scruple; and the idea that private wealth should carry with it some obligation on the part of its possessor to put it to any other than exclusively personal use is a present far to Utopian for serious consideration, except by exponents of the pernicious radicalism that sees in the division of property the panacea for all the social evils that beset us today. In the meantime, it would be a tremendous stride in the direction of national integrity that would wrest the admiration and tribute of mankind if we determined, come what may, to at least strictly legally, and in our public life be truthful, at least to the extent of refraining from the attainment of our own country for the sake of a fleeting advantage that must put us to shame in our better moments. Then we might begin earnestly to consider to what degree high Christian principles were compatible with sound progressive commerce.

If we seek the reason for this false standard of success, inevitably the right answer suggests itself: Materialism. And that we are materialistic is indisputable; evidences of the fact are sadly palpable. But what are the causes of the materialism? On analysis, their origin will be traced eventually to three predominant vices: selfishness, intemperance, and pride. There is nothing in our business, or in our social life, that is more honest, at least strictly legally, and in our public life be truthful, at least to the extent of refraining from the attainment of our own country for the sake of a fleeting advantage that must put us to shame in our better moments. Then we might begin earnestly to consider to what degree high Christian principles were compatible with sound progressive commerce.

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
