'THE LADY SYBIL arrived from Picton at 5 p. m. Monday evening. After landing a carload of freight, and taking the mails on board she left for the Magdalen Islands at 7 p. m. Among her passengers was Philip Bougeois, who was returning to his home from an extended visit on the mainland, and David Cobb, who was returning to his home in Fortune after being absent in New Glasgow for some months.'

'SCOWS LOST.—The tug-boat Mersey is at the Railway Wharf awaiting the return of the tug Amherst from St. Peter's Harbor. Several days ago the Amherst left port with the intention of bringing to Souris the scows of the lost dredge No. 1. It was found that two scows were a total loss, having been badly broken and damaged by the fierce seas; the third, however, being a new scow, only two months old, was able to stand the storm and drifted on shore, some miles west of St. Peter's. When the Amherst arrives in Souris, the Mersey will take the scow to Picton where it will be put on the slip. The Mersey will then proceed to Quebec and from there will tow a dredge to Murray Harbor, where the contract of dredging out the harbor has still to be completed.'

'SOURIS BREAKWATER. — On Tuesday of last week, advantage was taken of the spring tides and the third block of the new addition to Souris breakwater was placed in position. Everything was in readiness and grand success was met with. As soon as the crib was firmly placed on the bottom, it was ballasted by several tons of stone that were at hand. On Tuesday afternoon an additional gang of men were employed and they worked faithfully and hard until almost midnight. The work of throwing in stone was again resumed on Wednesday and continued throughout the day with the result that the approach of evening found the block safely secured in its proper position. The work on the fourth block is progressing rapidly. Last week it was moved out to deeper water and it is probable that it will be placed in position in the course of a week or ten days.'
