RATES AGAINST THE EAST

TORONTO, April 26—Representing the Dominion Millers' association, C. B. Watts appeared before the Dominion railroad board to protest against the proposal of the G. T. R. and C. P. R. to put into effect on May 1st, a new schedule for freight rates on flour to the maritime provinces which he contended discriminated against Ontario millers in favor of those in the west.

Mr. Watts pointed out that there were 32 decreases against 76 increases in Ontario. The decreases were at points where there were small shipments, while the increases mainly affected the big shipping points.

C. A. Hayes, general freight agent of the R. T. R. submitted his schedule of rates and claimed the equilibrium which existed for years had not been seriously disturbed. There certainly seems to be many more increases than decreases, said the chairman.

Another interesting barometrical animal is the geotop, one of the largest of insects. M. Fabre has studied the geotop by raising some of them in an aviary. These insects also do not leave their burrows until after the sun sets, when and only if the weather is suitable.

When the conditions of the sky seem to predict a fine tomorrow, the geotops are sometimes of another opinion, and it is proved that the insect by the subtlety of its impressions has foreseen—scented the shower—for the rain surely comes during the night.

BREAKS WORLD'S AUTO RECORDS

NEW YORK, April 22—New world's records for both the mile and the kilometer were established at Daytona, Florida, today, by Robert Burman, according to a telegram received here from Fred. J. Wagner, official starter of the American Automobile Association, at Daytona. The telegram states that Burman driving a 200 horse power Blitzen Benz, made the mile in a flying start in 26.12 seconds, and the kilometer in 16.27 seconds.

FIFTEEN BODIES TAKEN FROM OTT COAL MINE

ELK GARDEN, W. Va., April 25—Fifteen bodies had been taken out of the Ott mine, No. 20 of the Davis Coal Company at 10 o'clock today, victims of the disastrous explosion yesterday. Eight other dead bodies are supposed to be in the mine, which the rescuers are trying to recover. The bodies are charred and badly mangled and identification will be difficult.

SEEKS ANNULMENT OF HIS MARRIAGE

MONTREAL, April 24—On the ground that when they were married, thirty years ago, he was a Protestant and his wife a Roman Catholic, George Bowden, of this city, is now seeking the annulment of his marriage before the superior court through his attorney, Joseph Archambault, of Rodier and Archambault.

The recent annulment of the Hebert marriage on the ground that it was performed by a Protestant minister, and was therefore, not legal, has raised a storm on the right of the Roman Catholic church to declare such marriages invalid, and this new case will be watched with interest.

BIG BATTLE IN MEXICO

NOGALES, Mex., April 26—It is reported that a battle of serious proportions between the Mexican Federals and the Insurrectos has occurred near Mazatlan, the big port on the Pacific Coast, in the State of Sinaloa. Eighty wounded are said to have been brought into Mazatlan.

MEXICO CITY, April 26—Six Spaniards were shot and killed on Monday at the Hacienda Atencingo in the State of Puebla, by a small band of Rebels, following their refusal to contribute 50,000 pesos to the insurgent cause. Atencingo is the Hacienda where the Rebels some days ago secured a quantity of rifles, considerable ammunition and 25,000 pesos. On account of that loss the owner of the Hacienda, Angel Diaz Rubin, a Spaniard, announced his intention of demanding an indemnity.

LONGBOAT BEAT NEBRICH AT TEN MILES

BUFFALO, N. Y., April 24—Tom Longboat, the Canadian Indian, gave Frank Nebrich, of Buffalo, a minute's advantage at the start of a ten mile run over a twelve lap track in this city yesterday and finished in one hour, one minute and three seconds, with Nebrich still a lap to go. NEW YORK, April 24—Tom Longboat, the Canadian Marathon runner, has entered the fifteen-mile international race, which will be held under the auspices of the Monument A. C., at Celtic Park, on May 7. Longboat is in training at present in Canada.

"KANGAROO" INVOKED BY THE PREMIER

LONDON, April 26—Yesterday's session of the house of commons was again continued into the small hours of the morning. It was noticeable by reason of the prime minister invoking the so-called "Kangaroo" clause, whereby whole pages of amendments to the parliament bill, for the curtailment of powers of the house of lords was skipped at the chairman's discretion.

An important amendment, proposing a joint session of two hours in cases of disagreement, was opposed by Mr. Asquith on the ground that such a plan would always give the house of lords the last word in legislation, and in his opinion it would be impossible to devise a scheme which would not place the representative body at the mercy of the second chamber. This amendment and another, proposing instead of a joint session a conference of ten members from each house were both rejected by large majorities.

RELIEF COLUMN IN CRITICAL FIX

TANGIER, April 26—The latest news received here regarding the situation at Fez states that Capt. Brannon, who is marching at the head of a column to relieve the city, is in a critical situation, as he is short of ammunition and is completely surrounded by Cherada tribesmen who, far from being discouraged, have returned to the positions from which they were dislodged a few days ago. The Cherba tribesmen, who have been wavering, have decided to join the revolt.
