THE CATTLE EMBARGO.

Years ago when there was some cattle disease in Canada a restriction was placed by the Imperial authorities on the importation of cattle from this country. Whatever reason may have existed at the first has long passed away. There is quite as little danger of British cattle becoming infected from Canadian cattle sent to the British market as there would be of Canadian herds being infected from cattle imported from England if the latter were equally numerous. But the restriction, which was imposed as a measure of safety in the first place has been continued merely as a protective measure, to prevent the too strong competition of Canadian beef with that produced in Britain. Hence the rule is still obligatory that Canadian cattle must be slaughtered immediately on being landed in the old country.

All this is contrary to sound policy, is unfair to Canada, and conflicts with the settled policy of free trade which is claimed to prevail in the United Kingdom. It is moreover against the interest of the British consumer, and also against the interest of a considerable class who, years ago were engaged in the importation of Canadian cattle to be fattened, or to have the fattening process completed on the other side. This was at one time a large and profitable business, so large in fact that at Dundee, Scotland, some £30,000 was expended by the harbor trustees in providing wharf accommodation for this particular trade. Those wharves are without tenants and useless to-day because of the cattle embargo. We think another effort ought to be made to secure the abrogation of these restrictions, and that our case is so strong that a persistent effort might be made successful.

It has been discovered that petroleum will kill mosquitoes, and use is being made of the discovery to destroy the tribe of biting insects by wholesale. The insects breed in stagnant ponds, and crude petroleum spread on the water will prevent the young "skeeters" from growing to maturity. The prescribed dose is one ounce to ten square feet of water surface so it will be seen that a few gallons will cover quite a large pond. The plan has been tried by Gen. Wood with great success at Havana. Not only were the mosquitoes destroyed or driven away, but the yellow fever, which is said to be spread by their bites, has disappeared also.

Somebody has telegraphed to the St. John, Halifax and Montreal papers that the saloons are openly selling in Charlottetown, that there have been no convictions under the Prohibition Act, that the law is believed to be unconstitutional, and that the City Council by refusing to allow the police to assist in enforcing the law have "tied the Act up." Not even the recognized organ of the saloons in Charlottetown would give any such version of the situation here on the spot. There is certainly no open sale, and whatever may be done in secret there are many who desire to obtain a drink who after visiting many places where the stuff was formerly sold are unable to get it for love or money.
