POLICE COURT NEWS.

Saturday was the usual Prohibition day at the Police Court. There were only two cases each adjourned from the previous Wednesday and each for first offence. But they were more than ordinarily interesting to the spectators as they showed the devices to which the violators of the law will resort to escape convictions. The prosecutor was represented by F. L. Hassard, K. C. and J. J. Johnston and A. J. B. Mellish were counsel for defendants.

The first case was against Edward Collins. It had been adjourned for a witness named James Power whom Mr. Johnston desired to have in court. Power was not subpoenaed however, the defense expecting that after the expressed wish to have him present in the Court on the previous day, the fact that his name was on the information would be sufficient for the clerk to issue a subpoena. Mr. Johnston asked for another adjournment. Mr. Hassard contended that it was ridiculous to imagine that a subpoena would issue simply because an attorney stated in court that he desired to have a witness present. An officer went to hunt for Power; he could not be found and the case was adjourned till Wednesday.

Then came the iron-bre case. Joseph Pembroke who was conducting a Christmas trade at the saloon owned by G. A. Essery was the defendant.

Ernest White got liquor from the counter but thought it was a Christmas gift. He gave another fellow money to get liquor but got neither the money back or the liquor.

Robert Ford had got iron-bre the day before Christmas but did not know whether it was intoxicating or not. He asked for whiskey. Pembroke said he had none but would give him iron-bre. From another bottle he mixed in some ginger ale. He visited the place three times during the day for iron-bre.

Herbert Carver had been treated with a friend to iron-bre which was diluted with another fluid from a second ginger beer bottle. He did not think it was ginger beer. Gladly he thought there was liquor in it.

In the meantime Mr. Mellish had sent for a bottle of iron-bre. It was opened by Officer Harper and a glass poured out for Mr. Carver to sample.

Mr. Mellish—"Isn't this the same now as you got at Pembroke's?"

Witness:—It tastes something the same but there was something else in Pembroke's.

Mr. Mellish retired—amid great laughter.

Ford was next recalled and given some genuine iron bre. It was, he said, similar to what he got at Pembroke's but, with a nod of his head, "was not quite so wild in his mouth."

After some further evidence as to the others who were in the bar at the time, the case was adjourned, at Mr. Hassard's request till Wednesday next.

Patrick Prunty was before the court for drunkenness. He promised to begin the New Year aright by taking the pledge and the fine of \$50 or 90 days was suspended.

DEATH OF JOHN A KING FORMERLY OF CH. TOWN

There flashed across the wires on the 18th of December, the sad news that Mr. John A. King, formerly of this city, but lately a resident of New York, had passed away. To his widowed mother his brothers and sisters this was a severe shock. Not having heard of his illness they were unprepared for such news. The late Mr. King was 30 years of age. He began his early studies at Queen's Square School. From there went to St. Dunstan's College where he remained for two years. After leaving St. Dunstan's he entered Notre Dame University from which place he graduated in 1898. He afterwards did some journalistic work in Chicago and for the past three or four years he was Inspector of Cables on the Metropolitan Street Railway of New York. He married Miss Martha C. Paulie, of Brooklyn, New York—who survives him. About two years ago he paid a visit to his Island home and at that time was in perfect health—a fine specimen of manhood. As a school boy he enjoyed the good-will and esteem of all his fellow students and was a general favorite among them. His late employes were loud in their praises of his good work. He was a kind dutiful son and affectionate brother, a loving husband. His sister accompanied the body from New York to Charlottetown where on Christmas afternoon, his body was laid to rest in the Roman Catholic Cemetery. A large number of citizens, including many of his schoolmates of former years followed his remains to their last resting place.
