ITALIAN STABS TWO CANADIANS

One Will Die, The Other Recover; A Shocking Affray in New Brunswick Mining Town Near Fredericton.

FREDERICTON, Nov. 3.—(Special)—A serious affray took place at the mining town of Minto in which John Endine an Italian stabbed John McKay fifteen times and Christopher Pettley seven times.

At this stage Pettley interfered and took the gun away from the Italian. The Italian by this time had his anger thoroughly aroused and whipping out a knife stabbed Pettley seven times in the body and legs.

VON BUELOW MAY GO

New York Republican, Hughes Elected Governor, Massachusetts Carried, West Not Heard From—Newfoundland Elections Show Large Opposition Gains.

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—(Special)—Taft is elected President of the United States. The returns already received indicate that he is safe, though his majority of votes in the Electoral College will be small and reports from west will not be received until early morning.

NO BLOCKADE ORDERED

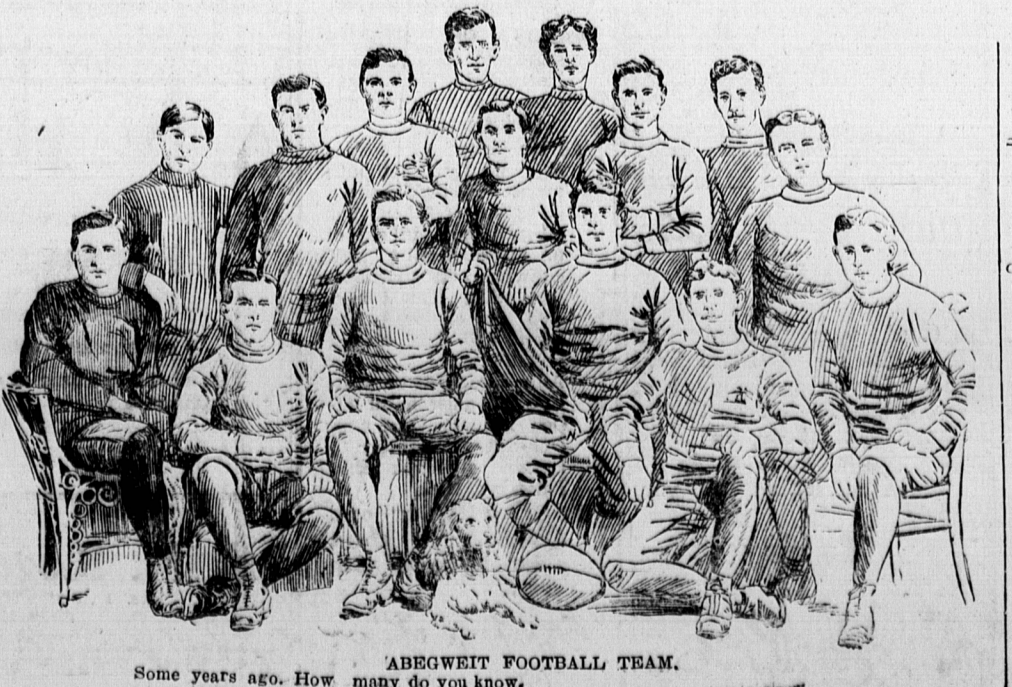
THE HAGUE, Nov. 2.—No blockade of the ports of Venezuela by the Netherlands Government has yet been ordered, nor will any definite action be taken until the Government receives the official text of President Castro's reply to the second Dutch note.

As has already been stated, however, Holland is fully prepared for any demonstration, including a blockade, that the circumstances may demand.

PROHIBITIONISTS CONFIDENT

CHICAGO, Ill., Nov. 2.—With the assertion that the vote for the prohibition party tomorrow will be twice as large as the largest ever before cast for the party, Chairman Charles F. Johns announced today that the Prohibition National Committee has been assured an income of twenty five thousand dollars a year for the next four years with which to carry on its work.

Mr. Johns said that the financial backing for the party has been pledged by one thousand prominent persons. "With the widespread interest shown in the work of suppressing the liquor traffic and the votes taken from the old parties by our presidential nominee, Eugene W. Chafin, we will force the prohibition issue as the dominant question in National politics," said Mr. Johns.
