introduced and will be welcomed. There are some Japanese pencils sold here which retail at a cent each.

We find that a lot of cheap Christmas and other cards come from the United States. There are some firms manufacturing cards in Canada, although it appears that cards bought from some large Canadian firms are marked "Made in Saxony." There is a high duty on American cards. Beautiful cards are made in England but are chiefly of the folder type, while in this city it appears that just a simple card is preferred.

Coal.—Practically only American hard coal is brought here, which to some extent is being replaced by Scotch and Welsh coal. Other coal used here comes chiefly from Nova Scotia and Cape Breton.

Rope and Fishing Nets.—Most of the rope used by Island fishermen is made at Plymouth in the United States, this firm are the oldest manufacturers of suitable rope for fishermen in the world and employ special machinery and specially trained men. Although this firm have a branch in Canada most of the rope used by our fishermen comes as we have said direct from Plymouth. There is no duty on rope coming into Canada from the United States for fishing purposes. The Canadian Consumer manufacture rope in Montreal, and also in Halifax. English rope for fishing purposes has also been tried and some users of it claim that it is better than the American but few can be enticed to give up the American rope which has for years given them satisfaction. This is a matter which should receive the careful attention of Canadian and English manufacturers. It would appear that in so far as the English article is concerned that the establishment of distributing warehouses in Canada would promote this line

of business to the benefit of Empire trading.

Fishing nets used by our fishermen are purchased chiefly in the United States. Many sizes of nets are used and our fishermen change their ideas from year to year, thus making it difficult for the dealers to know what to buy until about January or February. On deciding on quantities and sizes required a dealer can wire his order to an American firm and the nets will arrive in about two weeks while it would take a much longer time to get them from England. It would appear that in connection with the distribution of these products that Canadian and English firms should carefully consider and revise their methods, and your Committee would strongly urge that some steps be taken with the Chamber of Commerce and also with dealers and fishermen to try and overcome these difficulties.

The Island lobster industry has been flourishing for years, but has met some setbacks in recent years caused by some extent by the development of the Japanese crab business.

Our cheese and butter industries are apparently able to compare favorably with all competitors. We would suggest that some attempt be made to manufacture Craft cheese on the Island.

It would appear to your committee that if our local industries are to thrive in the way they should, and in deriving benefit this province by the employment of many more of our sons and daughters, that all must cooperate more fully than has been the case in the past, local jealousy must be laid aside, and all press for the sale of goods manufactured or grown in the province for the general uplift of this part of the Empire. May we add that it is quite noticeable that several of our Island products are put up in packages having a cheap appearance and unattractive label, which hinders the sale of a splendid product. We therefore stress the need of up-to-date bright packages for all Island products.

In all cases under survey manufacturers were of the opinion that expansion depends upon local support, greater interest and increased consumption of home products.

The necessity of support of local capital invested in our provincial manufacturing plants is one of the greatest needs to insure expansion. The place where money is invested enjoys prosperity, so will not Islanders invest more of their capital in Island industries?

More aggressive salesmanship on the part of our manufacturers seems to be necessary for increased business.

Much more can be done now and in the years to come if our merchants and consumers will but keep before them the benefits of Empire building—buy selling and buying goods made within the Empire.

Trade with one another first in this province, then in the Maritimes, then in Canada as a whole, and then from within the whole Empire.

One other point. Senator Hughes considers that Premier Saunders was very remiss in his duty in asking for only \$200,000 increase in subsidy in lieu of public lands, because he himself could prove that we were entitled to over \$400,000—"quite a difference and surely worth looking into." I have "looked into" this difference very carefully, and find that it is made up of arrears,—that is, interest on a capitalization of the amounts we should have received in the past; but did not.

That this is a valid claim cannot be gainsaid, but the Senator is very wrong in supposing for an instant that he is the discoverer of this fact. However, our Government went to Ottawa with a number of claims, and if arrears are added to one they may equally well be added to others. The total claim presented in 1927 was for an increase in subsidy of \$730,304.00, and who would be so sanguine as to hope for so much being granted? Why, then, clutter up the record with a further claim for arrears? I have made a rough calculation of what our claims would have been with arrears added, and find that to meet such a claim 3,009,814.00 additional would be required. Or, with compound interest, (and why not?) over \$5,000,000.00 would be required. In all fairness, does the Senator really think there would be "unjust discrimination" if the increase granted were less than \$3,000,000.00 yearly?

Yet it is on such a hypothesis that the Senator bases his attack on the Premier. The former was more modest in his demands in this connection in 1912 when he said on the floor of the House of Commons (Hansard, March 26th, 1912)—"Surely if Prince Edward Island is to get consideration... you would give her an additional \$75,000. and also an allowance of arrears... and these items would (all) equal \$100,000."

Can it be a recurrence of this modesty which apparently forbids him, now, to cooperate with our Government in this matter of subsidy? It must be modesty, Truly, a virtue!
