Organization Of Communist Party Is Fully Exposed

TORONTO, Ont., Nov. 13.—(By The Canadian Press)—The Communist party of Canada, which a jury in York County fall assizes last night found was an unlawful association, was formed out of the Workers' party, which was organized out of elements in the reformist-Socialist movement. The Workers' Party was formed in the winter of 1921-22, and at that time was divided into two sections. These sections, the "Z" and "A" were the "illegal" and "legal parties respectively. The latter worked above-board, with its moves open to the public. The "Z" party operated as an underground organization with the inner councils being hidden behind secret addresses and fictitious names.

At the third convention of the workers' party, held at Toronto in March, 1924, the two parties joined and became the Communist Party of Canada.

The party since its inception has been a section of the Communist International of Moscow and has been represented at all Congresses of the International by delegates. Applicants for membership in the party signed an application card reading as follows:

"I, the undersigned, declare my adherence to the program and statutes of the communist international and of the communist party of Canada and agree to submit to the discipline of the party and to engage actively in its work."

Party Organization

The structure of the party was as follows:

The highest authority was the central committee, which was elected by national convention. All eight convicted men were members of this committee.

The party was sub-divided into districts based on the economic character of the territory. There are at present nine districts.

A district committee was the highest authority in each district, although districts were sometimes sub-divided into sub-districts, each having its committee.

In the smaller cities, the entire city and its territory had a local executive committee, and the local committee was the highest authority in that case.

The basic unit of the party was known as "nuclei," of which there might be shop or street units. The shop nucleus was composed of three or more members working in the same shop, factory or mine. The street nucleus was composed of members living in a definite residential location who while working in a factory did not have enough party members in that factory to form a shop nucleus.

Shortly after joining the party, new members were given a pamphlet bearing the legend "revolutionary greetings." One paragraph says, in part:

"We remind you that through your voluntary entrance into our party you have pledged yourself to carry on firmly the struggle for the overthrow of bourgeois rule in accordance with the decisions of the party. From now on, the decisions of the party and the decisions of the communist international are your highest command."

The terms "proletariat" and "bourgeois" as commonly used by the party indicated, in the first case, all who worked for a salary. Bourgeois were those who were outside the first category.

Leaders Well Known

The eight communists convicted at Toronto tonight on charges of being and acting as members of an unlawful association and with helping parties to a seditious conspiracy were well known as leaders of the movement.

Tim Buck is of English birth, and came here in 1911. He is a machinist by trade, married and has three children. His home is in Toronto, and he was leader of the entire Canadian Communist movement. He has been an official of the party since its inception in 1921, and twice visited the congresses of the Third Internationale at Moscow. He was arrested in connection with his communistic activities in Chicago in 1922, but released.

In 1927 he was arrested again, this time at East Windsor and again released. Later the same year, he addressed students of the Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph, Ont., but was thrown in the Speed River and given a ducking before he had completed his speech. He ran for the Ontario Legislature in Toronto, October, 1929, but polled only 392 votes. Last year he ran for the Toronto Board of Control, but organizing ability.

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TRIBUTE TO W. C. T. U, HEAD CANADA AN ART CENTRE

CALGARY, Alta., Nov. 14.—Inspirational and moving were the tributes paid to the late Mrs. Louise C. McKinney, leader of Women's Christian Temperance Union in Canada at the recent unveiling of a portrait of the first woman in the Empire to be elected to parliament. The painting will be hung in the parliament buildings at Edmonton.

Mrs. McKinney sat for the artist, J. W. L. Forster, of Toronto, several times last spring while in Toronto attending the world's convention W. C. T. U. It is considered to be an excellent likeness, showing Mrs. McKinney standing looking straight forward, wearing a dark red dress, fingering a long string of jet beads.

"A work well done; a life well spent," said Dr. G. D. Stanley, M. P., in speaking of Mrs. McKinney's life and work in the provincial legislature where he was associated with her on many occasions. Mrs. McKinney was elected to represent the constituency of Claresholm in the provincial house in 1917. In enumerating her qualities as a public figure, Dr. Stanley placed first her unqualified sincerity with which was associated the courage of firm convictions.

Other speakers were Mrs. Nellie McClung, an intimate friend and associate for many years; Mrs. F. G. Grevett, representing the W. C. T. U. and Rev. R. W. Dalgleish, a pastor of her home church. Referring to the many sidelines of her life, Dr. Dalgleish said "Mrs. McKinney was Mary, Martha and Dorcas blended in one character."

Donors of the portrait included dozens of women's clubs and societies as well as hundreds of private subscribers.

Derby Cup To Be Sold At Auction

NEW YORK, N. Y., Nov. 14.—Six years ago a little black colt, named Flying Ebony in the racing records pound around a sloppy Churchill Downs course to win the premier trophy in United States thoroughbred horse-racing circles—the Kentucky Derby Gold Cup.

Before thousands of turf devotees Earl Sande, then rated the greatest jockey in this country, rode the black-hued thoroughbred to victory. Sande, one of the most popular jockeys at that time, secured the mount on the victor when the late Gifford A. Cochran, wealthy sportsman and patron of the arts, entered Flying Ebony, not in the hope of winning the coveted trophy but just to give Sande a mount in the race, for the great jockey had been strangely overlooked by other owners.

Now, nearly a year after Cochran's death, Flying Ebony's gold cup is to go to the block to be auctioned. Announcement of the sale of the historic trophy, caused a near sensation in United States racing circles, because never before had a derby trophy been offered for sale. Always these treasures are held in families as heirlooms and the price one would bring in auction is now being conjectured.

In addition to the cup, sporting prints and paintings, early English and United States furniture and decorations will go on the block.
