### AN AMERICAN VIEW.

The Portland Express discusses the recent Conference of Colonial Premiers in rather disparaging fashion, and reaches the sage conclusion that the British Empire is only a so-called Empire—an Empire only in metaphor. It may be of interest to note the process by which the Express leads up to so startling a conclusion. The Conference, we are told, accomplished little more than to name itself Imperial, to resolve to meet once in four years instead of once in five years and to establish a secretarial staff to collect information. "There was no disposition on either side to undertake the sacrifices necessary to make the British Empire a fact."

"The United Kingdom will take no step to tax itself in order to give Colonial breadstuffs a preference and the Colonies remain content that the Mother Country shall alone bear the burden of defence, so there is to be neither equality of burdens nor reciprocity of trade within the Empire." Britain has the expectation rather than the guarantee that the daughter nations shall aid her in war. "So the British Empire continues an anomaly. It is not an Empire in Russia the sense, for it has no centralized Government and its territory is not contiguous. It is not a federation in the American or German sense, for hostile tariffs divide the states. It is not a Zollverein such as that which gives Luxemburg the benefits of the German tariff. . . . The British Empire is, in fact only an idea."

Some of these statements are true. The British Empire is not an Empire in the Russian sense. Heaven grant it never may be. It is not a federation, or a Zollverein in the German or the American sense, but it does not follow that it is not something better and stronger. The German Empire, in its present form is but yesterday, and the German people know little or nothing of the freedom which is the birthright of all British subjects. They are crushed under militarism and police rule; the press is denied its liberty; travel is restricted by passports and police restraints; every citizen is in constant danger of being haled to the prison for some mild criticism of the Kaiser, construed into lese majeste. No British subject would desire to belong to an Empire like that of Germany.

And very few of them would desire to change to a Republic like that of the United States. The Republics of history have been short-lived compared with the enduring monarchies. The American people have many admirable qualities, but the history of the American Republic is not altogether alluring. It was very nearly run asunder from within some forty odd years ago. Britain suffered no such danger. The war of the rebellion cost billions of money. Millions of her colored people were held in slavery for scores of years after emancipation had been established in the British Empire. Three Presidents have fallen by the assassin's hand within a generation past. Law and order, security for life and property in the United States are far below the plane established throughout the British Empire. Easy divorce, unstable family relations, lynchings, graft, prevail beyond anything in British precedent.

Yes! the British Empire is unlike the other Empires, Kingdoms or Republics. One-fourth of the world's people, one half the world's sea-borne commerce, is under the British flag. How would our friend of the Express feel if for his own country he could make so proud a boast? The British navy holds the undisputed dominance of

### THE VICTORIES OF PEACE.

Lord Cromer in a parliamentary paper summarizes the benefit conferred upon Egypt by the construction of the dam across the Nile at Assuan, where the waters are stored in a vast reservoir for purposes of irrigation. He tells that the value of lands has been increased by \$120,000,000, the annual rental by \$7,325,000, and the cotton crop grown in that year amounted to \$141,000,000. Here we have an annual increase in the rental alone that is almost equal to half the cost of Sir Benjamin Baker's great engineering work. The dam cost \$15,000,000.

We do not sufficiently appreciate the fact that while the big debts of the great nations of the world represent the cost of wars—a work of slaughter and destruction of property—Canada's public debt is wholly made up of the cost of great public works, railways, canals, improved river channels, harbors, lighthouses and like improvements. Not all or many of these are so directly and largely productive as the Assuan Dam, but indirectly they are of great public utility and advantage that well repays the outlay. For a country such as ours expenditures along these lines is much better made than on forts, steel-clad warships or the cost of maintaining an army.

India under British rule, though not free from military outlay on a large scale, has spent vast sums in the construction of Government railways, and in works of irrigation which have enormously increased the productivity of the soil and done much to prevent the frequently recurring and terribly destructive famines of past generations. What war of a generation past has conferred like benefits upon so large a number of the human race as these great works of peaceful and progressive improvement? And the benefits of these victories of peace will go on from generation to generation yet to come.

It is sound wisdom for Canada to proceed along these lines of peaceful development, rather than in making costly preparations for war, or in burdening her people with an expensive military establishment. The construction of the Maritime Province Tunnel is a work along these lines. Its completion will be a great and fruitful victory of peace. It will mean the liberation of a Province from its cruel winter isolation. It will mean a great increase in the value of property on the Island, a large increase in the yearly pro-

ductiveness of our fertile acres, a great building up of trade and productive industry. The Assuan Dam was built to better the condition of the half a million fellahs of Egypt. His object was surely beneficent. No treaty stipulations required its construction. Our case is different. We are entitled to constant and efficient communication. Canada is well able to build the Tunnel and our free citizens are of more value than many Egyptians.

General regret is felt and expressed for the death which occurred Thursday night of A. D. McLeod, Cashier of the Customs in this City. He was born in Orwell in 1843 and appointed to the Customs staff thirty years ago. He was unexcelled in devotion to his official duties, kindly, sympathetic, upright and honorable in all the relations of life.
