Yesterday was another busy day at the Armouries, particularly with the Medical Service Board.

Captains Ross, McPhee and McMillan, examined twenty-five men, each man having a triple examination.

The work done by the Provincial Board is equal in its thoroughness and exacting nature to that of any medical council in the Empire. No physical deficiency escapes the eye of any of the presiding physicians—and all three examine each and every man.

The examinations are thorough, careful and detailed. Ever man passing the board, no matter what class he has been assigned to, can rest assured that the rating given him by the local board will be confirmed by the highest medical councils in the Empire.

RESULTS TO DATE AA (1) Men physically fit for trench warfare, with six months experience in military life. None. A (1) Men physically fit for military experience. Thirty registered last week, ten yesterday—total forty.

B.—Overseas, with A. M. C., A. S. C., Dental Corps or Railway Construction Corps. Last week six, yesterday four, total ten. D.—Home Defence. Last week twelve yesterday four, total sixteen. E.—Totally unfit for military service. Last week, twenty-six, yesterday eight, total thirty-four. This brings the total examined to date to ninety-nine.

(Continued from page five) students by giving a detailed account of their work in their final essays helped the department and so incidentally helped the general cause of agriculture in the province.

Hon. Murdoch McKinnon was the next speaker. He congratulated the students on the success they had made of this undertaking and very highly complimented Professors McLarty and Murphy on having originated a movement which could not fail if followed up, to exert a most beneficial effect upon agriculture in the province. He contrasted the present system of agriculture and its advantages with the conditions which existed some years ago when farm produce sold at starvation prices and men were obliged to abandon farming because it would not feed them. He spoke at considerable length emphasizing the necessity of doing things the right way whether on the farm or in college and urging upon the students the desirability of following up the experimental work they had undertaken.

Inspector Cain also gave an excellent address impressing upon the students the necessity of honest, unselfish work, co-operation among farmers and adoption of the best methods in whatever calling they follow.

A number of the students and the press representatives also spoke briefly expressing their pleasure at being present and their hearty interest

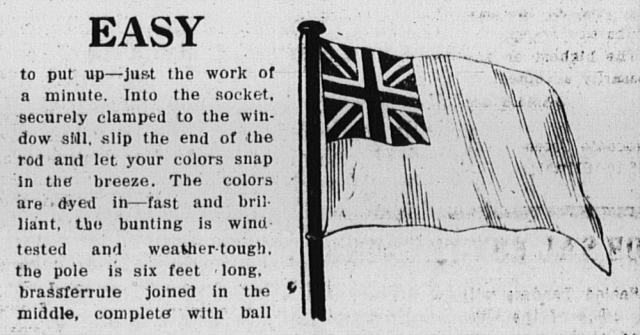
