C.C.F. Meeting At Covehead

"Every Province in Canada is operating under a 'chance economy' with the exception of Saskatchewan where they have a C. C. F. government that believes in economic planning," said C. C. F. organizer Douglas MacBrien at a public meeting held in Covehead Hall on Friday evening.

The C. C. F. government has set up 13 publicly-owned enterprises—owned by the people through their government. By doing this, the residents of Saskatchewan are accomplishing these things:

First, they are developing their natural resources; secondly, they are providing diversified employment for the young people who may not care to farm; and thirdly, the profits resulting from the operation of these enterprises will constitute an additional source of revenue, which the government will use for the purpose of giving the people better health care, educational improvements, etc.

"This is socialism," said the speaker. "This is the thing that the opponents of the C. C. F. are telling you is so terrible."

Washington Spotlight

The job of Vice-President has taken on a fresh attractiveness and the woods are full of those who could be induced to run but not much is being said about it at the moment.

Back in August 1923 Calvin Coolidge, a reserved and taciturn Vice-President, was aroused from his bed and advised that he was President of the United States because of the death in San Francisco of Warren G. Harding.

That brought a revival of interest in the Vice-Presidency which involves virtually no exercise of special talent or administrative ability beyond that of getting elected.

Through the long Roosevelt regime there were three Vice-Presidents: John Nance Garner of Texas, Henry A. Wallace who is the current "bad boy" of the Democratic party, and Harry Truman.

Again the office of Vice-President dropped into a category of comparative useless appendages to government until the day on April 12, 1945, when Roosevelt was stricken and the untrained, unprepared former Missouri Senator was thrust into the tremendously responsible post of President of the United States.

The Vice-President of the Senate as President (like the Speaker of the Canadian Senate) and that is about all he ever does.

Since Harry Truman stepped up there has been no Vice-President and the Senate presidency is held "pro tem" by the selection of the majority party in that chamber. It was Senator Kenneth McKellar of Tennessee until the Republicans got control of Congress in last November's elections. Then the winning party chose Senator Arthur Vandenberg of Michigan.

President Truman is considered a certainty for Democratic nomination for re-election in 1948 but there will be a scramble for the job of running with him for the Vice-Presidency.

The candidate probably will be picked from some Northern State where his influence can be used most efficiently in obtaining
