KING MAKES A PEACE SPEECH.
 LONDON, June 25.—In the course of a speech at the banquet to President Poincare at Buckingham Palace last night King George said:—
 "The two nations have been drawn together by a growing sense of unity of interest and identity of purpose. The aim which both Governments have kept constantly in view is the cause of peace which is the chief one of all. Our common interests lie in close co-operation for that blessed purpose."
 King George went on to say that during the international trouble of the past few months the mutual confidence and frankness with which France and Great Britain were able to approach the various problems proved to be of the inestimable advantage, while it was a source of the highest satisfaction that all the great powers consulted together and worked for peace.

President Poincare's reply was along similar lines and emphasized the efforts of France and England in recent months to preserve the peace. He said France, like England, had the happiness of working for peace with the perpetual co-operation of all the chancelleries and would continue to work with the same good will so that harmony may not be disturbed in the future.

President Poincare was the guest at luncheon today of the Lord Mayor and Corporation of the City of London, and the Square Mile, comprising the city proper, was in gala array for the occasion while the ancient guild hall was a blaze of colors. The French President's progress through the streets with troops from York House, placed at his disposal by King George, to the city was a popular triumph. It was marked by enthusiastic, welcoming cheers from thousands of sight-seers who took the occasion in this way to express their approval of the friendly agreement between Great Britain and France.

The scene during the luncheon was brilliant. The Hall was crowded with members of the Royal Family, Cabinet Ministers, Naval and Military officers and high state and civic dignitaries.

Fertilizer Formulas

Timothy & Clover

Mix the plant foods in the following proportions:

- Nitrate of Soda... 50 lbs
- Tankage..... 150 lbs
- Acid Phosphate... 700 lbs
- Muriate of Potash 100 lbs

Application 300 to 500 lbs. to an acre.

Potatoes

Here's a simple formula for late potatoes:

- Nitrate of Soda.... 150 lbs
- Tankage..... 100 lbs
- Acid Phosphate.. 600 lbs
- Muriate or Sulphate of Potash.. 150 lbs

This is the very best formula you could use and by mixing it at home you save 25 percent of expenses.

Turnips

Now is the time to prepare your turnip field and the following is a very successful formula used by all leading farmers.

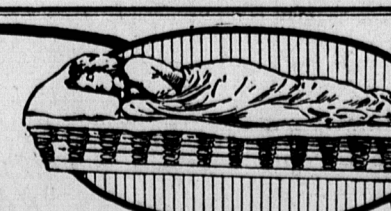
- Nitrate of Soda.... 150 lbs
- Acid Phosphate.. 400 lbs
- Muriate of Potash 150 lbs

This is to be used without manure and to be applied from 600 to 800 lbs. to the acre.
