## PREPARATIONS FOR ISLAND'S BIGGEST WEEK ARE NOW ALMOST COMPLETED

What an air of activity is in Charlottetown these days. The sound of the hammer, the sight of busy workmen constructing arches, while others are applying green spruce boughs, are indications that the great festification is at hand. The Committee on Decorations are showing great energy and excellent taste and are placing arches at advantageous routes upon what is to be the line of march for the grand parade on Wednesday morning and the big decorated floats parade on Wednesday evening. Wednesday will certainly be a banner day and Charlottetown will be filled with sightseers in the morning and they will throng the Charlottetown driving Park in the afternoon to witness the stirring races there. In the evening the decorated floats parade will hold their attention, but Thursday will equal Wednesday in interest, and those who cannot come on Wednesday, will certainly arrive Thursday to see the magnificent Soldiers' Monument unveiled in the morning and the Firemen's Tournament in the afternoon at the Charlottetown Driving Park, where over 300 Firemen will compete in the stirring program of Fireman's sports and athletic contest. The best of Prince Edward Island competing against the best of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. Twelve towns and cities are included in the line up. Friday the remaining events of the horse races will be put on, and Friday will be a day that will appeal particularly to those interested in the Sport of Kings. It is understood that New Glasgow, Stellarton and Pictou are making up a mammoth excursion to arrive in Charlottetown at one o'clock to take in the horse races at the Charlottetown Driving Park in the afternoon. They will no doubt remain until after the decorated floats parade in the evening probably returning about 10 o'clock. These visitors will be very warmly welcomed, and their presence appreciated. Restaurants and private parties who can give meals during Old Home Week should make every preparation and be prepared to handle a large number of people on Wednesday and Thursday particularly.
