NORTHCLIFFE HERE AS MISSION'S HEAD

Says His Task Will be to Co-ordinate the Work of British Agencies

NO TIME FOR SOCIAL EVENTS Called 33 Hours After He Accepted Appointment—Pleased to Return to America

NEW YORK—Lord Northcliffe, proprietor of The London Times, the London Daily Mail, and forty other English publications, arrived in New York Monday on his way to Washington. Lord Northcliffe announced at once on his arrival that owing to the pressure of work for his Government, he would not be able to attend any social entertainments. He courteously declined to comment on the war, the censorship, and similar topics, which were suggested to him.

From the time the post was offered to him by Premier Lloyd George until he sailed for America only thirty-three hours elapsed. His office staff will arrive in a few days. After going to a hotel Lord Northcliffe met some of the members of the British Commission stationed in New York, and afterwards went for a walk in Central Park. When asked for an interview he gave out a statement which he had prepared on the voyage, which he declined to amplify. The statement reads: "The War Cabinet has designated me head of the British War Mission to the United States, and I have been instructed to try to co-ordinate the work of the various admirable British organizations already established here. These are charged with the task of supplying our war and other needs. Until I present my credentials at Washington it is impossible, of course, for me to make any further statement. "I can, however, express my very great personal pleasure at being again in America, which I have so often visited and which has many delightful associations and friendships for me; nor is it saying too much when I add that the whole British people have a profound sense of grateful appreciation of the magnificent welcome accorded Mr. Balfour and his associates and the complete success of his mission."

The new head of the British commission appeared to be in the best of health and full of vigor: He wore a blue serge suit, soft gray hat and red checked tie, and carried a Malacca cane. Golf and motoring will be his recreations, when he takes any, during his stay in this country. He brought his golf outfit on the ship.

It is understood that the special mission of Lord Northcliffe will be to see that the British sub-commissions in the United States on ammunition, food, aviation and other branches of war needs shall cooperate, not only among themselves, but with the other commissions of the Allies in this country.

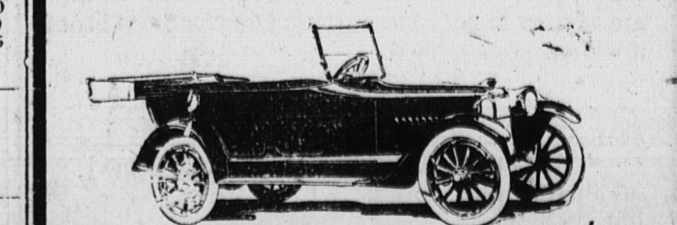
