The deceased young man had led quite an active life having served periods in the Northwest Mounted Police and with the United States Army in Cuba. He was among the troops who were called to San Francisco to preserve order after the great earthquake. Latterly he had engaged in fire-fighting, serving as brakeman on the Boston and Maine Line until failing health compelled him to retire and come home. He had been ill for about a year.

Returning pilgrims from St. Anne de Beaupre tell of some remarkable cures at the shrine. Among the St. John people to go was Mr. F. On our way up, a boy from Sydney lay in his bunk moaning with pain and could not sit up. His back was broken three years ago and he had not been able to walk since. He came back with us, and, what a change! He said his pain was gone and he sat up looking bright and cheerful and his happy face made us all feel cheerful.

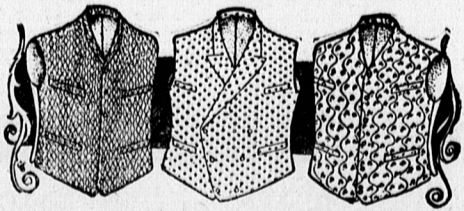
