SIMPLE FURNISHINGS FOR WARTIME

Simplicity should be the keynote in furniture style for wartime housing and, in fact, for all types of housing where space is at a premium, according to studies which have been conducted by governmental agencies in the United States.

According to a survey prepared for the National Association of Furniture Manufacturers and the Southern Furniture Manufacturers Association, the most needed improvement in war home interiors was for smaller furniture.

Tenants in many cases show a preference for impressive pieces and one expert in commenting upon this claimed that it showed a need for an educational campaign so as to bring taste more in line with utility. Cozier is one of the important factors in wartime furniture, due to the fact that wartime workers spend long hours at heavy jobs.

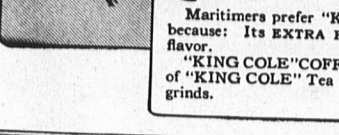

This effect can be largely gained through the effective use of color. Surveys of tenants have shown that colored walls are popular. She accuses me when I have not given them a penny since I have been married. All I want to give my parents is the love and the little attentions they deserve.

I love my mother and father, but love my wife best of all and put her first not only in love, but in everything else. Is there any way in which I can make my wife see that my relationship to my parents is simply that of a son and not a rival? It does not in any way conflict with my relationship to her? JIM.

URGES SOLDIERS TO BUY BONDS

THE COOK'S CORNER

BEST JELLY MOULDS

Two tablespoons plain granulated gelatine, 2 cups boiling water, 1/2 cup vinegar from pickled beets, 2 tablespoons granulated sugar, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1-2 tablespoon lemon juice, 1-2 cups shredded raw beets or if you wish use minced pickled beets, 1 tablespoon minced green pepper, 1 cup finely shredded cabbage, celery or cucumber. French cream cheese dressing, lettuce or crisp. Soak the gelatine 5 minutes in water to cover. Dissolve in the boiling water. Add vinegar, sugar, salt and lemon juice and, when beginning to slightly thicken, stir in beets and vegetables. Transfer to individual moulds first rinsed with cold water. Chill until firm, about 4 hours. Unmould on nests of lettuce or crisp and garnish with dressing.

BROILED STEAK

The meat is first wiped with a damp cloth, and then the fat edges are cut in several places to prevent curling when heat is applied. Arrange the steaks on the rack in the broiling pan. Preheat the broiler and place the prepared meat under it so that the top surface of the steaks are at least 2 inches from the source of heat. If the steaks are thicker than 1 inch, it is best to place them so that the top surface is 3 inches from the heat. Rib steaks or club steaks are broiled for 15 minutes for rare and 20 minutes for medium. Sirloin steak and porterhouse steaks are done for 20 minutes for rare and 25 minutes for medium.

When half the broiling time is up, season the cooked side with salt and pepper and turn the steaks over by placing a fork in a portion of the fat. Broil on the second side for the other half of the broiling time. Turn steaks that side and serve the steaks on a hot platter.

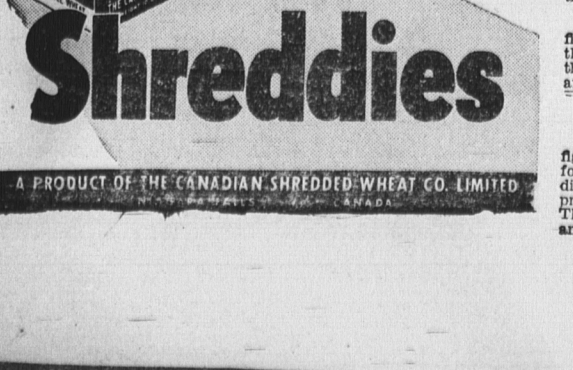
