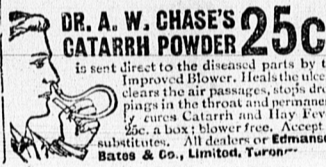

LATEST FROM THEATRES

NEW YORK HIPPODROME.

"Wars of the World" enters upon its tenth week at the New York Hippodrome Monday, enjoying an embarrasment of riches in the way of patronage, following the close of the political campaign. While the current offering at New York's largest theatre has drawn an unusually large clientele this season, the closing days of the campaign made themselves felt, but now with that "counter attraction" out of the way the Hippodrome has come into its own again. Taking advantage of the fact that the attraction is the largest spectacle on any stage in the world, and that it is occupying the vastest stage in the biggest theatre of the universe, the management has decided upon a policy of emphasizing its American origin and character. When the spectacle was planned last March orders were placed in Germany for the armor and knightly trappings and in France and Belgium for many costumes and properties. The outbreak of hostilities came before the day of delivery, in consequence of which Arthur Voeglin and his aides had to scurry around in the country acquiring the needed paraphernalia. They were successful and in consequence are fully entitled to the trademark of emphasizing its American origin and character. When the spectacle was planned last March orders were placed in Germany for the armor and knightly trappings and in France and Belgium for many costumes and properties. The outbreak of hostilities came before the day of delivery, in consequence of which Arthur Voeglin and his aides had to scurry around in the country acquiring the needed paraphernalia. They were successful and in consequence are fully entitled to the trademark of emphasizing its American origin and character.

"This is probably the first time this has been literally true of a stage production of such magnitude for Germany, France, Italy and some of the other European countries have enjoyed the advantage of furnishing more attractive and cheaper stage trappings and novelties than could be obtained in this country. That this condition may be at an end is demonstrated by the fact that costumes, gowns, boots and slippers and properties of all kinds used in "Wars of the World," biggest of Hippodrome productions, were made in or near New York. The only foreign made thing about the place is found in the toy balloon, given to children as souvenirs. These were delivered in New York on August 4th. The present supply is nearly exhausted, but no more will be ordered, as the only source available at present from which toys of that type and price can be secured in Japan, in order to give greater continuity and consistency to the "made in America" idea the use of the souvenirs will be discontinued when the present supply is exhausted.

HEARS POPE WILL SOON URGE PEACE

LONDON, Nov. 13.—Telegraphing from Copenhagen a correspondent of the Central News says: "A despatch received here from Cologne affirms that the Pope shortly will endeavor to institute negotiations for peace through the medium of a pastoral letter. "The German view of this is that any such action by His Holiness would revive the question of the Pope's temporal power and force Italy into taking an attitude against the proposal."

BRANTFORD ARRESTS SIX SCORE TURKS.

BRANTFORD, Ont., Nov. 12.—Anonymous veiled threats received by city officials here were indirectly responsible for the arrest of 120 Turks here last night, for detention in a military area. The same threats were responsible for the placing of an armed guard on the new \$250,000 Government building almost completed here, by P. H. Secord & Sons, the contractors. Mayor J. H. Spence and Chief of Police Slemm had both received

anonymous letters, giving the information that the Turks of the city were laying plans to blow up the new Government building.

Authorities Took no Chances. These letters may or may not have had truth in them, but the authorities took no chances. The Dominion police at Ottawa were notified, and they issued an order for the arrest and detention of all Turks in this city. Mayor Spence declined to talk on the situation, except to say that the authorities are perfectly justified in taking the steps that they have taken.
