The annual meeting of the St. John district of the New Brunswick and P.E.I. Methodist Conference, opened in St. John, Tuesday morning in the Portland Methodist church. Rev. Jas. Bailey, John A. Duke, and Dr. Edward Evans. The reports from a number of the churches were read and adopted. The evening session was open to the public and was attended by a large number. The work of God in the various fields in the district was reported upon and many helpful words were spoken. Rev. N. McLaughlin, Rev. S. Howard, Rev. J. A. Duke, Rev. Dr. Rogers, Rev. Dr. Wilson, Rev. J. Heaney, Rev. C. W. Squires, Rev. H. S. Young and Wm. J. Kingston. Rev. Mr. McLaughlin suggested the union of three of the churches for the purpose of holding revival meetings and bringing some noted evangelist to address the people. Rev. Mr. Heaney favored individual work and told of good results. Rev. Mr. Howard was in favor of the simultaneous mission, a movement in which the churches held meetings at the same time and caused a great awakening. He also told of the good work to be done in the Sunday School. Many delegates are present including a number from this Province.
