It is owing to his coolness that a terrible accident was narrowly averted, as, should rig and driver have gone over, they would have been dashed to pieces on the rocks on the lower side of the hill. Mr. MacKenna has returned to the city, and his numerous friends will be very glad to learn that, outside a few contusions and bruises sustained in his desperate struggle with death, he is as energetic and cheerful as ever. Luckily the horse escaped serious injury. The only damage to be seen is a twisted wheel and a few broken straps. In an interview Phillip laughingly remarked that he owed his escape to his constant contact with danger, which rendered him immune from a fatal attack of the "nerves."
