A brilliant comet is reported as visible in the evening sky from points in South America. It is invisible in Canada.

A crisis in the Japanese Cabinet resulted on May 2nd in the resignation of Marquis Ito the Premier, and his colleagues. This may have an important bearing on the strained relations between Japan and Russia.

In reply to a deputation from Buffalo, Lord Minto expressed the hope that he and Lady Minto will within a few weeks visit the Pan-American Exhibition, although they will be unable to do so on May 20th as requested.

Many American newspapers publish and credit the story that Mrs. Nation, of saloon-smashing notoriety has become insane as the result of the notoriety, excitement and mental strain to which she has been subjected. The Boston Traveller blames those who have encouraged and applauded her doings for having assisted in bringing about her loss of mental balance.

The Toronto Globe notes that at present Great Britain has about half the number of ships and half the tonnage registered at Lloyds. The total tonnage is 29,043,723 of which 14,261,234 is British, 2,750,000 American, 2,650,000 German, 1,640,750 Norwegian, and 1,350,000 French. But when steamships alone are taken, the American position is still worse, the figures being:—British, 12,149,000; German, 2,160,000; American, 1,455,000 and French, 1,052,000. The Leyland Line recently bought from the British owners by Pierpont Morgan is said to represent 321,000 tons.

The Parrsboro Leader has discovered what it alleges to be a source of public danger from which our own Province is not wholly exempt. The danger this time is in an undesirable class of peddlers who travel through the country retailing cheap goods, the product of the sweat-shops of crowded cities, the goods being probably laden with filth and disease microbes. Purchasers would do much better to buy of reputable merchants who in turn make their purchases from reputable manufacturers. Some of the peddlers described by the Leader are themselves filthy enough to contaminate a pack of decent goods, even if they had it.

The Halifax Chronicle puts forward the rather startling assertion that the most marked characteristic of the British people in America as compared with those in the Mother Land is the lack of moral courage on this side of the Atlantic. We

have defied the majority, it says, and politicians, judges and others are all too much trimming their sails to the popular breeze. Even in the drinking customs there is "a bar-made and bar-maintained public opinion," which requires that a man must take a friend with him when he quenches his thirst at a saloon. There is a dread of being singular, a fear of being called a kicker or a crank which the Chronicle finds prevalent in the United States and Canada to a far greater extent than in the British Isles. It adds:

"Out upon this contemptible subservience to The Majority which is becoming more and more the besetting sin of us all! Let us make an honest effort to assert ourselves and recover our lost freedom and manhood while there is yet time."
