WAR SCARES IN ENGLAND.

Lord Kitchener in India and Lord Roberts in the House of Lords at home have of late proclaimed the inadequacy of preparations against invasion. It seems probable enough that the land forces in India and in the Mother Country are not in the best condition to repel a large hostile army were such an event likely to occur at an early day. Both the military lords may be accepted as able expert authorities in regard to what counts for efficiency in an army. But as to the chances of the early invasion of either Britain or India their knowledge is not greater than that of many men who never held a military command or shouldered a rifle.

There have been many false alarms as to the impending invasion of the British Isles, but there has probably never been real danger of this sort since the battle of Trafalgar when the supremacy of the sea passed permanently to the British flag. Today Britain's first line of defence, her navy, is not only stronger than ever before, but is relatively stronger as compared with the fleets of other powers. The British navy is today equal in strength to the three strongest of her possible assailants. Of the latter France stands friendly, and after ninety years of peace between the two countries, and with the British and French navies now exchanging friendly visits and fraternising together, what chance is there of any attempt to invade the British Isles? France may be counted out of the program, and the German Emperor will hardly court speedy annihilation of his fleet.

India can only be seriously threatened by Russia, and Russia has had enough of fighting for the next quarter of a century. Moreover India has twice the population of Russia, and the Indian people trained under British officers make soldiers fully as efficient as those of Russia. The Hindus are not unintelligent and may be counted upon to prefer British to Russian rule. Furthermore the northern mountain boundary of India, pierced only by a few passes, is naturally and easily capable of defence, even if Afghanistan, the present buffer state were to pass under control of Russia. We conclude therefore that any present attempt to create a scare over a probable attempt to invade either Britain or India will not greatly alarm the British public. It may, however, lead to army reform, which in the light of the Boer war and the recent army scandal seems to be sadly needed.

THE PARLIAMENTARY SESSION.

It would be a much more sensible course and much more satisfactory to the country were the Federal Parliament to devote itself to shortening its needless discussions rather than to increasing the pay of members. The sessions of late years run to six or seven months in length. This year fully half the time has been taken up with discussion of the bills creating two new Provinces in the Northwest. So far as is known the pouring out of all this flood of oratory has not changed a single vote and was at no time expected to do so. It has been largely talk for talk's sake. A few only of the newspapers have attempted to give anything like a full report of the speeches, except of three or four leading men on each side, and practically no one reads the Hansard reports. The session has already been a very

long one, but very unfruitful of important measures. More money has been voted than in any previous session and apparently with less serious deliberation than usual. Never was time so unevenly and improperly divided between the really important and unimportant matters brought before Parliament. Reform seems to be urgently called for along lines that will check the needless talk, limit the length of speeches and conduct the business of Parliament on business principles. When this is effected the sessions will not be so long as now. On the other hand an increase of sessional pay has always been found to lengthen out the sessions. It is a costly business too, for it takes many thousands of dollars to pay for a single day's sitting.

NINETEEN DEATHS FROM HEAT REPORTED.

Boston, July 13.—For more than a week New England, that is that portion not affected by the sea breezes, has sweated in an almost uninterrupted wave of intensely heated air, more or less charged with moisture, and today was no exception. The rays of the sun shortly after noon today were probably more powerful than have been felt this year, and at least a score of people in Boston and vicinity were unable to withstand them and two persons succumbed altogether. The dead were Edward Flynn and Martin Mulken, both of this city.

The effect of the downward pouring of heat was somewhat mitigated by a brisk breeze from the southwest and numerous clouds which shut off the sun every few minutes. The atmosphere was not quite so saturated with moisture as on yesterday, but the thermometer touched 91 at 1 o'clock this afternoon, although it fell slowly but steadily towards night. Several thunder showers moved somewhat listlessly across Massachusetts and other parts of New England, but none of them had force enough to create any amount of damage.

The weather bureau tonight was unable to hold out any prospects for cooler weather before Sunday, and perhaps not until the first of next week, the temperatures being very high throughout the entire country.
