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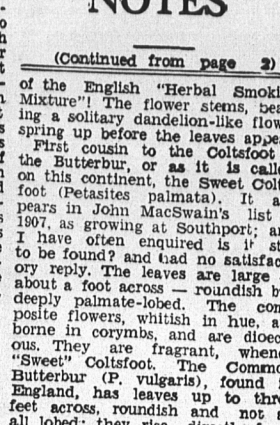

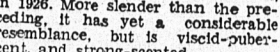

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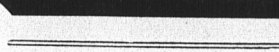

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CURRENT AFFAIRS

January 21st.-At the Pan-American Conference at Rio de Janeiro 21 republics reached agreement on a resolution for severance of relations with the Axis powers. In the case of Argentina, ratification by Congress will be necessary. The United States presented an 8-point program for hemisphere solidarity, of which the two most important are: to work for the elimination of trade barriers and the eventual establishment of a common currency.

January 23rd. Australia announced the landing of Japanese forces on New Guinea, the Solomon Islands, and New Britain.

January 25th. Australia mobilized all defence forces on a war footing in the event of a Japanese attack on the north and appealed to both London and Washington for aid.

January 26th. U. S. troops landed in Ireland as the spearhead of an A. E. F. expedition in the world conflict.

January 27th. The British Admiralty disclosed the sinking of the battleship Barham with a loss of 500 men off the coast of Norway. It is the fifth capital ship lost and leaves 13 including the newly commissioned 35,000 ton Duke of York.

January 28th. The seven-day battle of the Strait of Malacca between Japanese and Dutch-American naval and air forces resulted in 38 Japanese ships being sunk or damaged with casualties estimated at over 25,000 men. Axis forces recaptured Bengali.

January 31st. British forces withdrew from the Malayan mainland and Singapore. British defenders of the Burma Road evacuated the Strategic port of Moulmein and withdrew across the Salween River, 92 miles from Rangoon. Japanese forces landed on the Dutch Island of Ambon, the second largest Dutch naval base in the Indies and one which commands the sea routes from Australia and the United States to Java.

February 1st. United States naval and air forces attacked and severely damaged Japanese bases in the Marshall and Gilbert Islands.

February 3rd. Japanese air activity struck at Surabaya, Java, leading Dutch naval base in the Indies and at Port Moresby capital of Papua, 320 miles from Australia.

February 4th. A German counter-offensive recaptured Derna.

February 5th. The Admiralty announced the loss of the submarine Triumph in Burma. Japanese patrols crossed the Salween River.

February 7th. The Dutch admitted the loss of Ambon after sinking one Jap cruiser and damaging another as well as a submarine.

February 8th. Cairo announced that the Axis counter-drive in Libya had been stopped at the western approaches to Tobruk.

February 9th. Japanese forces formed bridgeheads on ten-mile stretch of Singapore on the ten-mile Chiang-Kai-shek arrived in Delhi to aid India's war effort by conferring with the Viceroy and Nehru, Gandhi's successor in the Congress Party.

February 11th. The British admitted the loss of Martaban on the Salween River in Burma.

February 12th. A Japanese demand for the unconditional surrender of Singapore was ignored. The German battleships Scharnhorst and Gneisenau and the cruiser Prinz Eugen ran the gauntlet of the Dover Straits.

February 14th. Japanese forces began the invasion of Sumatra.

February 15th. Prime Minister Churchill announced the loss of Singapore.

February 16th. German submarines penetrated the Panama Canal defence zone, sunk or damaged seven tankers and shelled the world's largest oil refinery on the Dutch Island of Auba. This is the first Axis attack on land establishments in the Western Hemisphere.

U. S. A. with those of Siberia and continental Europe via a tunnel or bridge across the 56-mile Bering Strait. This scheme was opposed by Tokyo, suspicious of any Siberian development after the Jap defeat of the Russians in 1905. However, MacDonell retained the idea of an Alaskan transportation link with the rest of the Western Hemisphere as a sound economic and defensive project.

For more than a decade, the idea was argued back and forth. Congress took the matter up in 1930, but the Canadian Government refused to co-operate preferring some alternate plan more favorable to Canadian Airways.

Now all the authorities of Canada and United States agree that the building of an American-Canadian highway is a necessity. Why? Events in the Far East have had the effect of forcing the people in the Americas to realize that their position in the world conflict, if one can predict the outcome of the German spring campaign against the Russians, should the Russians fall to stem the tide of German complications will follow. After Hitler's accession to power, a plan for a highway across the Bering Strait was worked out in great detail by German military experts and as a result of the "Alaska Plan" was erected on the island of Komandorsky Islands and in the many provinces of Siberia, opposite Alaska. These were built with German collaboration during the period between the two world wars.

On examining the geography of the area involved, you will find the waters of the Bering Sea, the Gulf of Alaska, the most north westerly of the waters, are only 47 miles wide. Actually the distance between Alaska and Siberia is much less. Strategically commanding Bering Strait are the two Diomed Islands, Big Diomed and Little Diomed, American. During the five or six months in which Bering Strait is frozen, the natives are accustomed to cross on foot over the two miles, which separate America from Asia, a half hour's walk at most.

During the period that Russia was working on the Bering Strait, the Komandorsky Islands of Diomed were fortified and many of the natives removed in order to provide accommodations for thousands of able-bodied young men of both German and Russian origin, which ordinarily could not support a hundred souls from the extreme south of Kamchatka to the north coast of Alaska, many military bases, radio transmitters, air fields, forts, and other installations were erected. The Komandorsky Islands were also built at the coastal cities of Petropavlovsk, Nichol Kamchatska, Kuraevsk, Cape Olotovsk, and Cape Navarin. A shipyard employing 15,000 men was built on the East Siberian Coast. A city named Komomolok was surveyed to house the workers, which now has a population of more than 200,000. A strategic railway was constructed from Khatanga to Komomolok, and another between Lake Baikal and Anadyrk.
