ALBERTON BOARD PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The report of A. J. McFadyen, President of the Alberton and West-Prince Board of Trade, was handed down at a recent meeting and after reviewing the principal events of the year in the outside world and in Canada, trade conditions, the fishery situation, the work of the lobster inspectors &c; he went on to say—"It is regrettable that our transportation grievances are still standing a menace to our business; there does not appear to be any prospect of immediate relief. If an earnest effort was made the three short hauls iniquity could be eliminated and thus show that there was a desire to place us on a footing with the other provinces.

We were promised a third winter steamer, but as soon as this boat went into commission the "Stanley" was taken off and the old order of winter communication will obtain. Our future hope is that the promised survey for a Tunnel will be reported on favorably as to the engineering difficulties and cost of construction. The persistent agitation of the Board of Trade for improvement in our facilities must be continued, and that by united action.
