HORSE RACES, held at Montague, on the river ice speedway last Thursday afternoon, were quite successful, but not very largely attended owing to the short notice given to the surrounding public, the day before being so mild and the ice so wet that it was doubtful as to whether the ice would be fit or not to race on the following day. The classes called were a free-for-all and a green race, the latter furnishing the most sport for the afternoon. The first class called was the free-for-all, and though there were four starters, some were disappointed, on account of some reported speedily horses, the winners of it is learned, were making some loud and insinuating reports before the race, not turning up when the appointed hour arrived. The four starters were Ferndale, owned by J. A. G. Ellis, and driven by Geo. Martin; Minnie M., owned and driven by the Murray's; Score Card, owned and driven by H. McGregor, and Arion, owned by Geo. McMillan. The horses got away after a few scores, Minnie M. taking the lead, but went to a break, and the lead was taken by Ferndale, which she held until the wire. She is very useful, but her new and enthusiastic owner may find the complex combination, and everyone hopes he will. The green race had six starters, the Comet, Preston Campbell, Sweet Marie, Cas. Clay, Nellie Bly, E. Campbell, Parkside Boy, John N. McDonald; Klip it, W. Bennick; and Sadie Chimes, Vernon Shaw. The horses got away on the third score, and it was a horse race all the way, first one horse in the lead then another, but the Comet finished first, with Parkside Boy second, Sweet Marie third, Nellie Bly fourth, Klip it fifth and Sadie Chimes sixth. In the second heat the Comet was first, Sweet Marie second, Parkside Boy 3rd, Nellie Bly 4th, Klip it 5th and Sadie Chimes 6th. In the third heat there was a change of programme, the Comet going to a bad break, and this time Nellie Bly got the right foot out and won the heat just by a nose from Sweet Marie, with the Comet and Parkside Boy fighting for third position, which the Comet won. The fourth heat was the last and most exciting of the day. The horses got away after the second score, and were well bunched all the way, and it was thought until the wire was reached that Sweet Marie would be the winner, but the Comet made a desperate charge and just won by an eyelash, with Sweet Marie second, Nellie Bly third, Parkside Boy 4th, Klip it 5th, Sadie Chimes 6th. Everyone looks forward to a match race between the Comet and Parkside Boy in the very near future, there being some big talk about the third and fourth heats, and it is hoped that it will not end in talk, but a demonstration of who really has the speed. The officials for the day were: Starters, J. H. McGregor and I. R. Brehaut; Judges, R. M. McMillan and Jas. McGee; patrol judges, Geo. McIntyre and T. B. Ives. He understood that Dan, McGregor, Montague, has recently purchased some new speed, that he is keeping up his deuce until the proper time arrives, when he will show the boys a thing or two.
