Samuel Kennedy, Kensington, was in the city yesterday. It is understood that Mr. Kennedy is about to take action against the Montreal Star for using his name in connection with the disappearance of Miss Nellie Priestland of Jarvis, Ontario. He discredits the Star's story and says that on writing to that paper demanding an apology, no reply was received.

The S. S. Bonavista arrived here from Montreal Wednesday and will sail about 10 o'clock this morning for St. John's, Newfoundland, via Souris and the Sydney's. She had a very large cargo of general merchandise inward. Her outward cargo consists of 1800 bags oats, 1527 bags potatoes, 132 packages condensed milk, ten barrels pork, thirty eight boxes cheese, ninety-four packages butter, eighty-eight cattle, seven horses and one hundred and twenty-eight sheep, besides sundry small packages.

The death occurred in the city yesterday morning, of James Currie, ex-Collector of Customs. Deceased had been in ill-health for about a year and recently was seized with an attack of paralysis which proved fatal. He was the son of the late James Currie, and was born in Charlottetown in January, 1835. He taught school for a number of years in the city and country, and in 1864 entered the customs service. He remained there for a short time only, but re-entered it on May 10th, 1880, as collector, as successor to the late Donald Currie. This position he filled with ability until his retirement in April, 1902, on a superannuation allowance. He was unmarried, and his only near relative surviving is a half-sister, Miss Flora Duncan.

Fred J. McLeod, of Boston, Chairman of the Massachusetts Democratic State Committee, has issued a statement disagreeing with the great Boss Crokers statement that there will be a Union of Democrats and Republicans in one great party. Both parties are undergoing a process of evolution, and a change of party alignment, says Mr. McLeod and the result will be that more clearly than ever the resulting Republican party will be the Conservative party, the party of stand-patism and of alliance with privilege, while Democratic party will be the distinctive Liberal party, the party of progress and of the people's spirit. In this process of evolution the Republicans who are Liberals will come into the Democratic camp, and the few Democrats who are Conservatives may transfer their allegiance to the Republican party. The outcome will not be one party, but two parties, each of which is homogeneous. Mr. McLeod is a native of Charlottetown, and has taken quite a prominent part in politics in the United States.
